INDEPENDENCE DAY - GOD BLESS AMERICA

Also called the Fourth of July, Independence Day marks the historic date in 1776 when the Declaration of Independence was approved by the Continental Congress. The written declaration stated that the American colonies were tired of being ruled by Great Britain. They wanted to become their own country.

A GROWING ANGER

Before the declaration, America was part of the Kingdom of Great Britain (now called the United Kingdom). In the 1600s, people came from Great Britain to settle in what is now North America. Between 1607 and 1732, the British founded 13 colonies: Virginia, New York, Massachusetts, Maryland, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New Hampshire, Delaware, North Carolina, South Carolina, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Georgia.



As these colonies grew, the people who lived there thought the British government treated them unfairly. For instance, they had to pay taxes on items such as tea and allow British soldiers to stay in their homes. The colonists had to follow these laws but couldn't do anything to change them. The colonists rebelled. As a result, the Revolutionary War between the colonists and Great Britain began in 1775.

Fighting wasn't enough though. The colonists decided they needed to declare their independence in writing to explain their reasons and gain support from other countries like France. On July 4, 1776, a small group of representatives from the colonies—called the Continental Congress—adopted the Declaration of Independence.

WHAT WERE THE UNITED STATES CALLED BEFORE JULY 4TH, 1776?

"THE UNITED COLONIES"

The President of the Continental Congress, Richard Henry Lee, wrote in a June 7, 1776 resolution: "These United Colonies are, and of right, ought to be, free and independent States." Before 1776, names for the colonies varied significantly; they included "Twelve United English Colonies of North America."



INDEPENDENCE DAY - GOD BLESS AMERICA

DECLARING INDEPENDENCE

Written by a committee led by Thomas Jefferson, the document was signed by people from all 13 colonies. But the British government didn't accept it. So the colonists continued to fight for independence until they finally defeated Great Britain in 1783.

The Declaration of Independence, now housed at the National Archives in Washington, D.C., is recognized around the world as an important message of self-governance and human rights. The second sentence says it all: that all people are created equally and have rights that include life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. (Fun fact: Jefferson, who would become the third U.S. president, wrote that sentence!)

Today the United States and Great Britain are friends. Most Americans still celebrate Independence Day, often with parades and fireworks. Historians think this is thanks to a letter written by John Adams, who helped write the declaration and would also go on to be the second U.S. president. In his letter to his wife, Abigail, Adams predicted that the colonists' independence would be celebrated by future generations as an annual festival with parades and bonfires.

And where is that band who so vauntingly swore, That the havoc of war and the battle's confusion A home and a Country should leave us no more? Their blood has wash'd out their foul footstep's pollution. No refuge could save the hireling and slave From the terror of flight or the gloom of the grave, And the star-spangled banner in triumph doth wave O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave.

O thus be it ever when freemen shall stand Between their lov'd home and the war's desolation! Blest with vict'ry and peace may the heav'n rescued land Praise the power that hath made and preserv'd us a nation! Then conquer we must, when our cause it is just, And this be our motto - "In God is our trust," And the star-spangled banner in triumph shall wave O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave.

Last fall the Mission Committee of the Barnes Community Church began a new local outreach program in the Barnes community. The Ramp Lending Program is designed to provide the use of an accessibility ramp to individuals who have a temporary need for a ramp. Temporary is considered to be 5 months or less with a possible extension. The program will provide borrower's time to determine a permanent solution to their situation (healing, building a permanent ramp, relocation, etc.). In addition to the BCC congregation, the program is available to residents of Barnes and those within five miles of Barnes.

Like giant Legos, the aluminum sections are modular and can be fitted to different configurations. Helping to navigate one or many steps, they are equipped with two sets of handrails and have a carrying capacity of 1,000 pounds. Potential sites will be evaluated on feasibility. No fee is charged for participation, and BCC members will assemble the ramp. A signed waiver is required.

Ramps have been installed on two sites where residents were recovering from surgery.

Artifacts related to all of Barnes' early schoolhouses will be displayed throughout the building, along with historical documents, photographs, collected memories, etc. Our hope is to educate and inspire an understanding of what "life within these schools" was like for students, teachers, and community members.

I will happily arrange to pick up any items and cover any costs that might be involved. If you have any relevant items that are not on our list, please let me know. APRIL REMINISCING - The Windsor; Marie's Laker Lounge, Danny's Laker Lounge; The Swiss Chalet; The Country Store and what's thought to be the original town hall.

As most of you know, the Windsor has had many faces over the years. When I sat with the various owners to gather stories I was reminded of customers names I'd not heard of in decades! Growing up here, I knew most of them, but the years erased so many and unfortunately, we have lost most of them. I hope you enjoy reminiscing about when you last visited this building and who owned it at that particular time.

The BEGINNING:

The building which is now known as the Windsor, carries a couple of theories. One, it's believed to have been the first town hall built in 1906. At that time, it was located at the junction of Barnes Road and Ellison Lake Road. Around 1932 Stanley Barnes and his wife Gretchen purchased the property. There were several buildings, but that particular building would be used as a tavern/pool hall, with gas and a store. I'm told that there is a sign at the old location "marking the spot." You can still see the original foundation. Stanley and Gretchen would eventually serve hamburgers, malts, etc.

Next, "THE COUNTRY STORE": Stanley and Gretchen Barnes

In the early 1950's, Gretchen and Stan would decide to move the building from Barnes Road and Ellision Lake Road to where it stands today at Lake Road and Outlet Bay Road. They would name it The Country Store.

It was a smaller building at the time and I'm told the whole town turned out to see the move. Once moved, it took some time to get it squared away, but would still be run as a tavern, with gas pumps out front.

The store would be started at the new location roughly three years after the move. From the time they opened the store people from Superior and Duluth would come down for Gretchen's "beef burgers." She was an artist and drew a picture of a bull with a ring in it's mouth just "snortin", and printed the words "our burgers are all beef, and that's no bull." They also had chili and soup. It also served as a residence as it had at the old location.

There was no plumbing in the building until it was moved to Lake Road and Outlet Bay Road.

In 1959/1960 Stan and Gretchen sold the business to Herman and Trudy Dittmer and "The Country Store" would soon be know as "The Swiss Chalet".

Then on to "The Swiss Chalet" - Herman & Trudy Dittmer

In gathering information for the Swiss Chalet, it was so great to catch up with Herman and Trudy's daughter Irene Drallmier. Trudy and Herman came to the U.S. from Switzerland in 1947 through Ellis Island, with daughter Irene, an Uncle and his wife.

I wasn't old enough to ever visit the Swiss Chalet when the Dittmer's owned it, but growing up just down the road I had plenty of time with the family. Herman and Trudy purchased "The Country Store" from Stanley and Gretchen Barnes in 1959/1960, continuing it as a store for a short time. By 1963 it was in full swing as the "Swiss Chalet". Herman and Trudy moved to Barnes from Verona, WI to start the supper club. Herman had been a contractor by trade so was quite handy with what needed to be done.

Trudy and Jean Barker cooked together and when Herman decided bartending really wasn't his thing, Trudy then tended bar and Jean would take over the cooking.

Irene and her brother Fritz worked the restaurant for a short time, and within A few years, Fritz would decide he had other plans.

So much history, and so little space.

After leaving the supper club business, the Places built a home on Wallman Road and continued to be a part of the Barnes community. Ron was an avid euchre and pool player and Natalie helped to establish the Barnes EMS program, and was one of our first EMTs. The kids graduated from Drummond High School and currently live in cities around the Midwest.

Danny's objective was to keep the guality of the food at the highest." He did all his own cooking, purchasing the highest quality of meat and other products which were a major factor in his ability to achieve that objective. At age 10, Dan went to work for Herman and Trudy Dittmer, owners of the Swiss Chalet. He washed dishes, worked as a bus boy, and helped make salads.

When he was 12 he began doing some fry cooking for the Dittmer's in addition to the chores he was already doing. Dan attended cooking school in 1972-73 at WITI in Ashland. During that time, he gained on the job training at the Frontier Supper Club.

After serving in the Army for 3 years, Dan began looking for a restaurant to purchased. He decided he liked Barnes and wanted to stay there. In 1976, Dan's dream came true and he greeted customer in the building in which he had gotten his first taste of restaurant

Naming his business "Danny's Laker Lounge" his personal touch came soon after. Part of the building was the Barnes Tavern,

Dan's parent s played a huge part in supporting him and his new adventure. His mother, Doris Drinkwine, tended bar for about 4 years. Dan's dad, Walt Drinkwine, built the bars, both front and back,

Sitting with Dan, he recalled the storm of the 4th of July, 1983 when the restaurant lost power. While trying to keep going, Danny and crew hung lantems and after, the customers noted that they "had no idea the power was out." Dan served 250 customers that night, with

Dan would cater bowling banquet and Christmas parties, would also showcase his specialties of delicious ribs, steaks and seafood. Take a look at the prices back in the 1970's compared to the prices in the 1960's. What a difference between places today. Can you imagine getting a thick steak with all the fixins' for \$5 or \$10 now? WOW.

ROBERT DUANE MIX "BOB" January2, 1931 to May 20, 2025

His remarkable ability to inspire and bring out the best in his students was recognized through numerous accolades. Bob received the F. Melius Christiansen Lifetime Achievement Award in 2004, the Weston H. Noble Choral Award from Luther College in 2008, and was inducted into the Austin High School Music Hall of Fame in 2009. He was also honored with the inaugural Duluth East Hall of Fame induction in 2012.

In 2009, Bob celebrated the 50th Anniversary of the A'Cappella Choir with a memorable reunion and concert with hundreds of alumni attending, solidifying his place as an influential figure in the choral music community. His contributions were not only marked by accolades, but by the countless lives he touched through music, mentorship, and a deep passion for his craft.

He celebrated his 90th birthday in 2021 with the gift of a virtual choir performance called "Hallelujah Chorus for Bob Mix," featuring past students, family, and colleagues. It became a cherished tribute that he watched on YouTube often in the final years of his life.

Bob's love for teaching was matched only by his devotion to his family, particularly to his wife Lois. A proud father, he instilled in his children the same values of dedication, love for the arts, and hard work - particularly at the family cabin, which he and Lois built from the ground up. Town of Barnes Aquatic Invasive Species Projects

Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) Projects for 2024 are underway. The projects are planned and managed by volunteers on the AIS Committee, the Clean Boats Clean Waters (CBCW) Coordinator, BAISS and Diver Coordinators, and Social Media Coordinator.

The BAISS boat is the town-owned diver-assisted-suction-harvester (DASH) used on the Eau Claire Chain of Lakes to harvest plants known to be invasive species such as curly-leaf Pondweed and Eurasian watermilfoil.

The work for 2024 has been completed on the Headwaters of the Eau Claire Chain: Sweet, Shunenberg and Smith Lakes. There were 48 bags of curly-leaf Pondweed harvested though the efforts of certified divers and volunteer deckhands.

Upper Eau Claire Lake currently holds the "honor" of being the heaviest laden with invasive weeds such as curly-leaf Pondweed. It is critical to get these invasive weeds under control and/or eradicated as much as possible. New beds of CLP have been discovered this year. The BAISS pontoon boat is already stationed on Upper Eau Claire and will remain there until June 27th. Divers are working Monday to Thursday to harvest as much as possible.

Lower Eau Claire Lake has smaller beds of curly-leaf Pondweed but it is essential to keep it from spreading to the river leading to Gordon and beyond. The divers will begin harvesting here on July 1st.

Middle Eau Claire Lake harvesting will begin July 15th. Curly-leaf Pondweed beds are abundant in bays near the public boat ramp, with smaller beds found intermittently in the lake.

The divers cannot dive without at least one volunteer on the pontoon.

Could you please find time to donate at least one 4-hour shift this summer?

What does a BAISS pontoon volunteer do?

When divers harvest the weeds, they insert them into a vacuum tube that shoots the weeds back up into the pontoon.

Weeds land into a screened rectangle in which the volunteer simply scoops them out, tries to get water out of them, and then inserts them into a garbage bag hung next to the screen.

When a garbage bag gets full, the volunteer changes out the bag.

After returning to the dock the volunteer helps to carry the bags to the property owners' designated roadside spot for pick up by another volunteer.

RECYLCLING MYTHS AND FACTS:

The most common items to be recycled are: Mail, paper, glass bottles & jars, aluminum, stell & tin cans, plastic bottles, jugs and tubs.

Myth: Any plastic can be recycled

Fact: Only plastic bottles, jars, jubs, tubs with a # 1,2,5 are recyclable. Plastic buckets / pails and lids are not

- <u>Myth:</u> Plastic bags, electronics, medical waste, Styrofoam, plastic totes, lawn chairs, empty oil containers, Amazon/ USPSshipping bags, pots and pans can be recycled.
- Fact: NONE of these are to go into the recycle bins
- Myth: Any item placed in the recycle bin will be recycled
- **Fact:** This is "wish-cycling". Too much contamination will cause the bin to be emptied in the landfill and fines will be levied to the transfer station.
- Myth: It is ok to place small amounts of food waste (garbage) in recycle bins
- Fact: ALL ITEMS MUST BE CLEAN Nothing with food waste, grease, etc. is recyclable
- <u>Myth:</u> Plates, bowls, cups, saucers, glassware are cyclable
- Fact: They are not. This includes dirty paper plates/plastic ware and solo cups

ITEMS NOT ACCEPTED AT THE BARNES TRANSFER STATION: Paint, moto oil, gas, explosives, fireworks, ammunition, flammables, antifreeze, lubricants, corrosives, etc. Ask attendant if in doubt. Keep foods and liquids out of recycling. No loose plastic bags, bagged recyclables or Styrofoam.

EVERY TUESDAY

All cardboard boxes mut be flattened and 3x3 ft or smaller. No pizza boxes.

When a Workforce Shortage Crisis and a Caregiving Crisis Meet

"Wisconsin Working Caregivers: Strategies and Resources for Employers"

Madison, WI – The workforce shortage crisis being felt by businesses across Wisconsin includes a characteristic that is often overlooked: The need to support family caregivers in the workplace.

Employers experience a drain on productivity when employees struggle to balance their work lives with the responsibilities of caring for children, aging relatives, or disabled family members. In a recent survey, more than eight in ten employed caregivers in Wisconsin reported having their work life interrupted, resulting in workplace accommodations such as using flex time, reducing work hours, or quitting work entirely.



"Without adequate support, working caregivers and their employers suffer," said Lynn Gall, Family Caregiver Support Programs Manager for the Wisconsin Department of Health Services and member of the survey project conducted by the Wisconsin Family and Caregiver Support Alliance (WFACSA). "The results showed us the challenges faced by working family members and friends and the businesses that employ them. Our goal at WFACSA is for every employer in Wisconsin to know about our state's free Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRCs), family caregiver support programs, and other community organizations available to help support their employees."

Conducted in partnership with UW-Madison Division of Extension, <u>the Wisconsin Working Caregivers Strategies and Resources</u> <u>for Employers</u> report published by WFACSA provides insight into challenges of recruiting and retaining employees in the current job climate. It also identifies opportunities for businesses to make positive changes simply by tapping resources already available in every Wisconsin community.

Numerous studies, including a <u>Harvard Business</u> School project called "Managing the Future of Work: The Caring Company," note that employers can attract and retain more workers by helping staff balance work and family caregiving responsibilities. Employers may not realize that one in four working-age adults provides care or financial assistance to an older family member or loved one With a disability or long-term such as an adult child, spouse, or other loved one. This means that at least one quarter of potential hires and those currently working are balancing home and job responsibilities in addition to traditional child rearing.

"We learned that a few small changes can transform businesses into a place where employees will want to build a long career," says Harriet Redman, Executive Director of WisconSibs and member of the WFACSA project. "That is why we are excited to share our survey results and open the conversation around the free and low-cost strategies and resources already available to support businesses."

The survey also found that nearly 3/4 of respondents were not meeting their own personal needs, such as taking care of their own health, and 2/3 had difficulty balancing care for someone at home. Seventy-two percent said they were tired or worn out all the time, while 90 percent said their 2 emotional or physical health had worsened since taking on a caregiving role. (2-page synopsis of survey findings here.)

Approximately 40 million Americans are providing care to an adult family member or friend, and nearly 60% of them (approximately 24 million adults) also work a paying job. Even more workers are providing care for a child with disabilities or special healthcare needs. Not only do employed caregivers experience high levels of stress, but their dual roles also impact their careers and employers.

The UW Division of Extension Employed Caregiver Survey is free and available to any employer interested in surveying their own workforce.

CANNING YEAR ROUND

TIPS FOR SUCCESSFUL CANNING:

- Select fruits and vegetables when they are at the peak of their quality and flavor, washing them thoroughly before using.
- Follow the directions for each recipe exactly—don't substitute ingredients or change the processing times. Prepare only one receipt at a time; do not double recipes.
- Substitute a cake cooling rack if you don't have a rack specifically made for canning. Place in the canner before you add the canning jars.
- Use only white vinegar when pickling.
- Use a canning funnel, which has a wide opening and sits on the inside of the mouth of the jar, allowing you to fill the jars cleanly and easily. Wipe the threads and rim of each jar to remove any food that spills.
- Reuse screw bands if they are not warped or rusty. Jar lids are not reusable however, so use a new one for each of your canned creations.
- Accurately measure the head space—the distance between the top of the jar to the food/liquid inside. This is critical because it affects how well the jar seals and preserves its contents. A clear plastic ruler –kept solely for kitchen use, is a big help in determining the correct headspace.
- Refrigerate leftover product if there's a small amount left that won't completely fill another jar. Use it within several days.
- Use non-metallic utensils when removing air bubbles from the jar and measuring head space.
- Store home-canned foods in your cupboard for up to one year.

HOT JARS VS. HOT STERILIZED JARS:

Why do some canning receipts call for hot sterilized jars, while others call simply for hot jars?

If the mixture will be proc3essed in the boiling-water canner for 10 plus minutes, jars just need to be hot.

If it's less than 10 minutes, jars need to be sterilized in boiling water for 10 minutes (or 1 minute more for each 1,000 feet of additional altitude.)

You may ask, why do the jars have to be hot before hand? The liquid/food you're putting in them is boiling hot, thus if the jars are hot (besides the obvious sterilization) you aren't putting hot product into cold jars and taking a chance of them breaking either when the product goes in the jars or when you put them in the water bath.

PAY ATTENTION TO THE PECTIN

Liquid and powdered pectin are made from the natural pectin in apples and citrus fruits. However, they are not interchangeable. Always us the specific type of pectin called for.

BEEF SHORT RIBS

Beef short ribs are a cut of beef from the chuck, plate, rib, or brisket area of a cow, containing a short piece of rib bone encased in meat. Beef short ribs are known for their rich flavor and marbling, making them ideal for slow cooking methods like braising. They are also sometimes called braising ribs, crosscut ribs, or English short ribs.

Short ribs are known for their flavorful and succulent texture, particularly when slow-cooked. I prefer to use boneless short ribs, although some people enjoy the additional flavors provided by the bone.

Most butchers have a good selection of beef short ribs available for purchase. You may also find a limited selection at your local grocery store. If you are in the Northland, good quality boneless short ribs are usually available at SuperOne in Superior and bone-in ribs can be found at most Walmarts. Sam's Club also has bone-in short ribs; however, these are usually cut very thin and have poor results when braised and slow-cooked. Reserve these thin cuts for a quick, hot grilling. No matter where you purchase your short ribs, remember to look for good marbling. Plenty of fat will provide great flavor when slow cooked.

Braised boneless beef short ribs makes an ideal dinner when you want an easy, savory, set the Crock-Pot and forget kind of meal. This recipe produces a wonderful sauce and is best served over mashed potatoes, white rice or wide egg noodles. Enjoy!

Braised Boneless Beef Short Ribs

- 1 tbsp olive or avocado oil
- 2-4 lbs boneless beef short ribs
- 1 cup diced yellow onions
- 2 tbsp tomato paste
- 2 tbsp minced garlic
- 1 cup beef broth
- ¹/₂ cup red wine (dry, not sweet)
- 2 tbsp red wine vinegar
- Salt and pepper to taste



In a large skillet, heat oil on medium-high. Season the short ribs with salt and pepper. Lightly brown short ribs in the hot skillet 1-2 minutes on each side. Remove short ribs from skillet and set aside. In the slow-cooker combine garlic, onions, and tomato paste. Add short ribs, red wine, beef broth, and red wine vinegar. Cover and cook on low 6-8 hours. Plate beef short ribs

- In another bowl, whisk together the biscuit mix, milk, garlic powder, onion powder, salt, and pepper until everything is nicely combined.
- Gently fold the chicken mixture into the biscuit mix. You want it just mixed-no overdoing it!
- Spoon the mixture into the muffin tin, filling each cup around 3/4 of the way full. If you're a cheese lover, sprinkle some cheddar cheese on top for extra goodness.
- Bake in the oven for 18-20 minutes, or until they turn a lovely golden brown color.
- Let them cool slightly before diving in!
- Enjoy your Mini Chicken Pot Pie Muffins! They make the perfect snack or dinner option.

ÉCLAIRE DESSERT:

For the Cupcakes:

1 box yellow cake mix (or your favorite vanilla cupcake recipe) Ingredients as per box instructions (eggs, oil, water)

For the Vanilla Filling:

1 package (3.4 oz) instant vanilla pudding mix 1 1/2 cups cold milk

For the Ganache Topping:

1 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips 1/2 cup heavy cream

1. Bake the Cupcakes

Start by preheating your oven to the temperature specified on the cake mix box. Line a cupcake tin with paper liners. This step ensures your cupcakes come out easily after baking.

Prepare the cake mix according to the package instructions, adding the necessary eggs, oil, and water. If you're using your favorite homemade vanilla cupcake recipe instead, that works perfectly too! Once mixed, carefully fill each cupcake liner about 2/3 full with batter. This allows enough space for the cupcakes to rise and bake evenly.

Bake the cupcakes according to the package directions or until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean. Allow the cupcakes to cool completely on a wire rack before moving on to the next step.

2. Prepare the Vanilla Pudding Filling

While your cupcakes are cooling, it's time to make the rich vanilla pudding filling. In a medium-sized bowl, whisk together the instant vanilla pudding mix and cold milk until smooth. Allow the mixture to sit for about 5 minutes so it thickens up and takes on a pudding-like consistency. You'll want it thick enough to fill the cupcakes without running out.

Once the filling is thickened, set it aside while you prepare the cupcakes for their delicious surprise filling.

3. Fill the Cupcakes

Once the cupcakes have cooled completely, use a small knife or cupcake corer to cut a hole in the center of each cupcake. Be sure not to cut all the way through—about an inch deep will do the trick. This creates a small pocket for the creamy vanilla pudding to go.

Spoon or pipe the prepared vanilla pudding into each cupcake. You want to fill them generously, but not so much that the pudding spills over the top. The pudding filling is the star of these cupcakes, so don't be afraid to make them nice and full!

4. Make the Chocolate Ganache Topping

Now comes the fun part—the glossy chocolate ganache! To make the ganache, start by heating the heavy cream in a small saucepan over medium heat. Bring the cream to a simmer, but don't let it boil. Once it's simmering, remove it from the heat and pour it over the chocolate chips in a heatproof bowl.

Let the hot cream sit for about 2 minutes to soften the chocolate chips. After 2 minutes, stir the mixture until smooth and glossy. The ganache should be thick but still pourable—if it's too thick, you can let it sit for a few minutes to cool slightly or add a touch more cream.

5. Top the Cupcakes

Now, it's time to finish off these cupcakes with their decadent chocolate topping. Spoon the ganache over each filled cupcake, allowing it to drizzle gently down the sides. The ganache will set as it cools, creating that signature shiny, smooth finish.

Once all cupcakes are topped, let them sit at room temperature for 10–15 minutes for the ganache to firm up slightly before serving.

AMERICAN FLAG PIE Online Recipes

Ingredients:

- Homemade or store bought pie crust (2)
- 1/2 cup (100g) granulated sugar
- 1/3 cup (35g) cornstarch
- 1 cup (140g) blueberries
- 1 cup (100g) blackberries
- 2 cups (300g) chopped strawberries
- 2 cups (450g) halved dark sweet cherries
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice, divided
- 1/2 teaspoon **almond extract**, divided
- egg wash: 1 large egg beaten with 1 Tablespoon (15ml) milk
- optional: coarse sugar for sprinkling on crust

Directions:

- The crust: Prepare my pie crust recipe through step 5.
- Make the filling: In a small bowl, stir the granulated sugar and cornstarch together. In a medium bowl, combine the
 blueberries and blackberries together. In a large bowl, combine the strawberries and cherries together. Stir 1/4 cup of
 cornstarch mixture into blueberries/blackberries. Stir remaining cornstarch mixture into strawberries/cherries. Add 1
 teaspoon of lemon juice and 1/4 teaspoon of almond extract to each fruit mixture. Place in the refrigerator for a few
 moments as you roll out the crust.
- Preheat oven to 400°F
- Roll out the chilled pie dough: On a floured work surface, roll out one of the discs of chilled dough (keep the other one in the refrigerator). Turn the dough about a quarter turn after every few rolls until you have a circle 12 inches in diameter. Carefully place the dough into a **9-inch pie dish**. Tuck it in with your fingers, making sure it is smooth. Fold the aluminum foil several times to form a 2-inch wide strip. Place into crust, dividing it into 1/3 and 2/3 sections as pictured above.
- Spoon strawberry filling into large section, leaving any excess liquid in the bowl (you don't want that in the filling discard it). Spoon blueberry filling into smaller section. Again, discarding the excess liquid. Place the pie in the refrigerator until top design is ready.
- **Design the flag:** Remove the other disc of chilled pie dough from the refrigerator. Roll the dough into a circle that is 12 inches diameter. Using a sharp knife, pastry wheel, or pizza cutter, cut 4 strips that are 2 inches wide and 6 inches long. Using your star cookie cutter, cut 12-14 stars. Re-roll any dough scraps if needed. Remove the pie from the refrigerator, remove aluminum foil strip, and add top decor to pie. Stars over the blueberries; strips over the strawberries to form an American flag design. Use a small knife to trim off excess dough on the sides. Crimp the edges with a fork or flute the edges. (*Review my how to crimp and flute pie crust tutorial if you need extra help with this step.*)
- Lightly brush the pie crust with the egg wash mixture. Sprinkle with coarse sugar, if desired.
- Place the pie onto a large baking sheet and bake for 20 minutes. Keeping the pie in the oven, turn the temperature down to 350°F (177°C) and bake for an additional 30-35 minutes. After the first 20 minutes of bake time, I place a pie crust shield on top of the pie to prevent the edges from browning too quickly.
- Allow the pie to cool for 3 full hours at room temperature before serving. This time allows the filling to thicken up. Cover leftovers tightly and store in the refrigerator for up to 5 days.
