SFMNP Vouchers Available in June

The Bayfield County Department of Human Services will once again be distributing the Wisconsin Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP) vouchers to low income seniors beginning in June 2017. The goal of this program is to help seniors improve their diets with fresh produce while giving local farmers more business and adding support to the local economy.

To be eligible for the program in Bayfield County, you must be a Bayfield County resident, 60 or older (55 or older if you are Native American), and at or below 185% of the Federal Poverty Limit (FPL).

For a one person household, 185% RPL is \$1,860/month or \$22,311/year. For a two person household, 185% FPL is \$2,504/month or \$30,044/year. For each additional household member, add \$645/month or \$7,733/year. Income is self-declared; you do not need to show verification of income.

If eligible, you will receive one set of vouchers worth \$25, with a limit of one set per household. The vouchers are distributed on a first come first serve basis, and cannot be sent through the mail. You need to show up at a distribution site in person or send a signed note with a friend or family member stating that you would like that person to pick up your vouchers for you. That person will also need your address, phone number, and date of birth to complete the Eligibility Agreement form on your behalf.

Barnes Highway Department Report: Eric Altman - Foreman

- Assisted in installing the new Town of Barnes sign in front of the Town Hall. Balsam Trees were trimmed and the boulevard was landscaped.
- The Department has begun the rental of a CAT 279 skid steer and a CAT 136 excavator with a thumb attachment to begin the Tomahawk Park building site and ski trail expansion.
- Layout was done between the Department and Nelson Lumber for the warming hut in the Tomahawk Lake Park.
- 66% completion in the brush disposal area. 50% of the debris piles have been disposed of.
 Dirt balancing has begun.
- The dock has been fixed at the Upper Eau Claire boat landing.
- Assisted the DNR in the installation of the boat landing docks on Middle Eau Claire and Pickerel Lakes
- Negotiations are in process with regard to Lake Road Construction
- Sand has been blown off the town roads
- Take off has begun on the 7 locations for the White Ladder Business Signs. Date for completion and installation of signs TBD
- 90% of the gravel/dirt roads have been graded and are in good shape

FLAG ETIQUETTE — STANDARDS OF RESPECT

www.usflag.org/flagetiquette

The Flag Code, which formalizes and unifies the traditional ways in which we give respect to the flag, also contains specific instructions on how the Flag is not to be used.

- The flag should never be dipped to any person or thing. It is flown upside down only as a distress signal.
- The flag should not be used as a drapery, or for covering a speakers desk, draping a platform, or for any decoration in general. Bunting of blue, white and red stripes is available for these purposes. The blue stripe of the bunting should be at the top.
- Advertising signs should not be attached to the staff or halyard
- The flag should never have placed on it, or attached to it, any mark, insignia, letter, word, number, figure, or drawing of any kind.
- The flag should never be used as a receptacle for receiving, holding, carrying, or delivering anything.
- The Flag should be cleaned and mended when necessary.
- When the flag is lowered, no part of it should touch the ground or any other object; it should be received by waiting hands and arms. To store the flag, it should be folded neatly and ceremoniously.
- When a flag is so worn it is no longer fit to serve as a symbol of our country, it should be destroyed by burning in a dignified manner.

Some American Legion Posts regularly conduct a dignified Flag burning ceremony, often on Flag Day, June 14th. Many Cub Scout Packs, Boy Scout Troops, and Girl Scout troops retire flags regularly as well. Contact your local VFW, American Legion Hall or Scout Troop to inquire about the availability of this service. Barnes VFW, Cable Legion Post 487and Boy Scouts of America, Cable only accept Flags for proper disposal.




THE HISTORY OF OUR AMERICAN FLAG

The first American Flag, called the *Grand Union Flag* was in use from December 3, 1775 to June 14, 1777. **Margaret Manny** is credited with creating that flag.



- Some attribute it to **Betsy Ross** who purportedly sewed the first flag in 1776 from a sketch handed to her by George Washington.
- Others attribute the design to **Francis Hopkinson** of New Jersey, a naval flag designer who designed inbetween 1776 to 1777.

Obituaries - REMEMBERING LOVED ONES LOST



On April 28, 2017, **Neil R. Paulson** of Drummond, Wisconsin, passed away, peacefully surrounded by family, following many years of cancer treatments. Neil was a loving husband to Pat for nearly 60 years. He was a wonderful dad to daughter Beth and her husband Randy, and son Paul and his wife Betz. He was a proud grandpa to Sam and Callie, Owen, Sarah and Kelly, and Kori and Isaac.

Neil was born in 1934 in Ashland, Wisconsin, to Nell and Gil Paulson. As a youth he enjoyed frequent hunting and fishing trips with his dad. He graduated from Ashland High School in 1952. His senior quote was "likes to argue and question all things, for to remain silent no knowledge brings." Neil met Pat in high school, and they married in 1957.

Neil graduated from Michigan Tech with a degree in forestry in 1957 and completed his post-graduate work at University of Minnesota. After graduation, Neil and Pat headed west with all their belongings in a Ford station wagon. Neil started his 31- year career with the US Forest Service in Estacada, Oregon. Paul and Beth were both born in Portland, Oregon, during Neil's time in Estacada on the Mount Hood National Forest.

Neil's career also took the family to the Wenatchee National Forest in Cle Elum, Washington; the Gifford Pinchot National Forest in Trout Lake, Washington; Forest Service Headquarters in Washington, DC; and Flagstaff, Arizona, where he served as Forest Supervisor on the Coconino National Forest. Neil traveled extensively during his career and chaired the National Wildfire Coordinating Group, which led the effort to achieve a broad national standardization in key areas of incident management. The Incident Command System is used by government agencies and other organizations nationwide to manage emergency incidents.

After retiring, Neil and Pat bought Bear Country, a sporting goods store in Drummond, Wisconsin, which they owned for seven years. During this time and up to his death, Neil continued his public service: he was active on the Bayfield County Board of Supervisors, the local fire district, and the local criminal justice system; he was an advisor and participant on local issues, especially related to natural resources; and he was a volunteer for many organizations. He was proud of his work helping to re-introduce elk to northern Wisconsin.

The family enjoyed many camping trips, clam digging, snowmobiling, boating on Lake Powell, and enjoying the outdoors. Neil loved the outdoors, and he enjoyed many hunting, fishing, and nature trips, many of these with Paul. Pat and Neil enjoyed being involved in Sam and Owen's upbringing, and visiting Beth and Randy and their family in California. Neil was a big hockey fan, season ticket holder for the University of Minnesota Bulldogs for many years, and he loved to watch grandson Owen play high school hockey on the Hayward Hurricanes. Neil also made two trips to Finland (a lifelong dream), where he got to know relatives in his native family village of Ojala (his mother's maiden name). Neil was also an avid runner, finishing several marathons, some of them with Beth.

Through most of his illness, Neil stayed active, even when he had no other medical options. Neil was mostly Finnish, and there is a very important characteristic of all Finns that is best described by the word "sisu." Sisu is a never-say-die individualism that Finns seem to be born with; they have the physical energy and mental endurance to stick to a job until it is done, and done well. Neil was "sisu" in his journey through all the stages of his cancer and in his life.

Neil will be missed for his determined nature, his merry wit and love of jokes, his generosity, his love of family and friends, and his never-ending public service.



THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

June 20, **1782** – The U.S. Congress officially adopted the Great Seal of the United States of America.

June 10,1652 – In Massachusetts, silversmith John Hull opened the first mint in America, in defiance of English colonial law. The first coin issued was the Pine Tree Shilling, design by Hull.

June 1913 – American football coach Vince Lombardi (1913-1970) was born in Brooklyn, New York. In 1959, he became head coach of the Green Bay Packers, winning five NFL titles and two Super Bowls in nine seasons. He is generally regarded as the greatest coach and the finest motivator in football history. He retired in 1968, but was lured back to coach the Washington Redskins. He contracted cancer after coaching the Redskins for just one season and died September 3, 1970 in Washington D.C.

June 14, 1775 – The first U.S. Military service, the Continental Army consisting of sic companies of riflemen, was established by the Second Continental Congress. The next day, George Washington was appointed by a unanimous vote to command the army.

June 15, 1215 – King John set his seal to Magna Carta, the first charter of British liberties, guaranteeing basic rights that have since become the foundation of modern democracies around the world.

June Birthday - Boxing champ Jack Dempsey (1895 – 1983) was born in Manassa, Colorado. Dubbed "The Manassa Mauler," he reigned as world heavyweight champion from 1919 to 1926. Following his boxing career, he became a successful New York restaurant operator.

June Birthday – Film comedian Stan Laurel (1890 – 1965) was born in Ulverston, England. He teamed up with Oliver Hardy as Laurel & hardy delighting audiences for more than 30 years.

A few downy feathers flew, but they were pretty tired." The Bergmans called the game warden but before he arrived, the eagles unhooked and flew off in different directions. Larry said, "Apparently they were none the worse for wear!"

The 52nd Annual Governor's Opener on Lake Namakagon, at Lake Woods' Resort in Cable, was very successful. Governor Walker caught the first two walleyes, with 10 walleye in total caught by the group.

The Barnes opening day didn't bring any "big" fish stories, but was successful as well. In sitting with Tom, he reports that Walleye fishing has been best in shallow waters, in about 6-10 feet and on the "windy" shorelines. Crappies are staring to move into shallow water, Bluegills are still out fairly deep. Some of the fishermen have been getting good size fish while walking along the shorelines. On the Eau Claire Lakes, fishing seems to be best on Upper and Lower, while fish-

ing on the Middle has been a little slow.

Fun Note: The last fish caught by a governor was Governor Thompson. However, it was not caught on his own line, but a nearby fisherman tossed *his* catch to him.



R-C's DeCoy Celebrates 30th Anniversary

In May 2017, Carole DeWitt celebrated the 30th anniversary of she and her husband Ralph owning R-C's DeCoy in May of 1987. The bar is located on State Highway 27 and County Highway N in Barnes and has known a few owners since it's start.

In 1933 the bar was built and owned by Jim and Marie Cafone until they sold it in 1956. Interesting that their name was Cafone, as this was the era of Al Capone, and also the spring when prohibition came to an end. During this 23 year ownership, the bar faced Hwy N.

In 1956, Bill Hoffer from Superior bought the bar from the Cafone's. In 1959 when Hwy 27 was brought further north, Bill moved the bar so it faced Hwy 27. Bill's grandson and great granddaughter still visit the bar frequently.

In the 1970's, Warren "Vandy" and Betty Vandelist bought the bar from Bill, renaming it "Vandy's DeCoy Inn". They had one son, Tom, who attended Drummond High School (a year ahead of me) Tom still has a cabin here. I recall many great times at the Decoy, many of us who grew up here do. Both Warren and Betty are gone now, but are remembered fondly.

In 1987, Carole and Ralph DeWitt bought Vandy's DeCoy Inn, and have seen many people come and go. It was her husband Ralphs idea to move to the north woods and own their own business. Carole preferred to stay in Chicago by family, but he talked her into it. Ralph succeeded in making his dream come true and retire in "God's country."

Ralph and Carole had two sons. Mike, 16 and Mark, 4 when they moved to Barnes. Both boys went to school in Drummond as well. Carole has 5 wonderful grandchildren that she is very proud of.

Many events have taken place over the years that have brought people from all over the area and beyond. To mention a few, the charitable breast cancer ride "Bikers for Boobs"; the 4th of July Men's softball tournaments, August Women's Corn and Brat softball tourney at the Barnes Town Hall (which started back in the 70's) and the men's August softball tournament at the Barnes VFW.

Carole told me "I remember our Grand Opening which included live music, dancing and *imagine*....a ton of fun. What I remember most importantly, are the people I've met that have left footprints on my heart."

I've chatted with local residents about the bar and the changes it has seen. The owners, past and present are spoken of very highly throughout the community and many remember "good times" when they reminisce of years gone by.







TIME CHANGE for Medicare 101 Presentations!

In January 2017, the Bayfield County Elder Benefits Specialist, Sheila Mack, began providing "Medicare 101" presentations once per month, January through September, throughout Bayfield County. The presentations had started at 3:00 p.m. and lasted up to 2 hours, but due to audience feedback, the remaining presentations, beginning with April's presentation, will start at **6:00 p.m**. and last up to 2 hours, depending upon the information reviewed and questions asked by those attending the presentation. Hopefully this will be more convenient for attendees. Also, refreshments will be served.

These presentations will introduce you to the basics of Medicare and give you the information you need to know before making any decisions about whether you want to enroll in all parts of Medicare at age 65, some parts of Medicare, or none of them; and the possible consequences of not enrolling when you are first eligible to enroll. You will also learn about the three types of insurance that supplement Medicare because Medicare only pays 80% of hospital and medical costs, and the need for creditable prescription drug coverage either through Medicare Part D, Wisconsin Senior Care, or a Medicare Advantage Plan.

If you will be turning 65 this year, attending one of these trainings is strongly encouraged. The time available for the Elder Benefit Specialist to work with you in the office is becoming more and more limited due to the increase in assistance being requested. In order to provide prompt and efficient service to as many clients as possible, this presentation will provide basic information on Medicare in a group setting rather than one on one in the Elder Benefit Specialist office. This training will give you enough information to understand your options and be ready to make decisions when it is time to do so.

NAMEKAGON TRANSIT BAYFIELD COUNTY ROUTE





TIPS AND TRICKS

Baking Preparation:



- All ingredients should be at room temperature before you begin (this mainly applies to butter and eggs) –
 you can always soften butter in the microwave but remember that you want it softened, not melted
- It's always a good idea to sift your dry ingredients to avoid lumps
- A spatula is your best friend regularly scrape the sides of your mixing bowls
- When using berries, dust them with a spoonful of flour before adding to the mixture this helps to prevent bleeding into the batter
- When mixing, gently fold the liquid ingredients into the dry ingredients you don't want to lose all the air that makes cakes rise
- When mixing sticky, goopy ingredients, try spraying the measuring cups with non-stick spray first the ingredients will come out easier (also works on your hands if you're handling dough)
- When trimming pastry, use smooth, downward strokes with a knife
- Always grease and line your baking tin and use paper liners for odd-shaped trays (such as muffin tins) –
 for a ring (such as Bundt or Kugelhopf), grease with butter and dust the insides with flour

The Spice Corner

Cardamom Spice

Cardamom is one of the oldest known spices. In Ancient Egypt it was used in perfumes. They simply loved the aroma of the cardamom spice. The cardamom spice comes from Cardamom plant (Eletteria Cardamomum). It is a perennial plant native to southern India and Sri Lanka. It grows in great abundance in forests from 800 – 1,500 meters (2,500- 5,000 feet) above sea level. After two to three years the plant will be about 2 meters (6 -9 feet) tall. The plant can grow to about 5 meters (15 feet) tall. Cardamom replants easily from just a piece of the rhizome.

Cardamom has gorgeous flowers that somewhat resemble irises. The cardamom fruits are capsules that contain around twenty grains. These are the grains we use as a spice. Cardamom pods need to be individually picked using scissors. This is not a job for the impatient person. Not all fruits ripen at the same time. The harvest may continue for several months.

Cardamom Spice - Culinary Uses

You will find that there are both black cardamom pods and green cardamom pods. The black cardamom pods have a smokier flavor. If you get the whole pods remember to open them and use only the seeds inside when grinding. Some will grind the whole pod but that is a poor solution. A good coffee grinder will do the job. You can also buy the ground spice.

Cardamom spice certainly has a very pleasant taste. In Northern Europe it is quite common to use cardamom spice when baking.

When baking, the green cardamom is used. Some say that you can use cardamom in recipes that call for vanilla. Just replace the vanilla with cardamom. A teaspoon of ground cardamom is often included in sweet bun recipes. They use it in cakes and cookies. Why not try cardamom cookies?

Cardamom can be used in main dishes as well. There are thousands of recipes with cardamom. You could even try cardamom meatballs.

In Asia, especially India, cardamom is a very common cooking spice. It is one of the spices used in the mixture of spices known as curry.

In the Middle East cardamom is added to flavor coffee. In Iran cardamom may be added to tea.



- 1 8 ox box of moist chocolate cake mix

Powdered Sugar

Use a large bowl and cream the cheese and butter until blended. Beat in the egg

Add the vanilla, and the cake mix. Mix well. Cover and set in the refrigerator for 2 hours.

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Roll the dough into walnut sized balls. Roll in powdered sugar and put on ungreased cookie sheets.

Bake for 12 minutes. Cookies will remain soft and gooey.

NOTE: I wear plastic gloves so the dough doesn't get into my nails.



SOPAPILLA CHEESECAKE PIE

From: Allrecipes.com (Great for Pot Lucks)

Ingredients:

- 2 (8 ounce) pkg cream cheese, softened
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 tsp vanilla extract (calls for Mexican)
- 2 (8 ounce) cans refrigerated crescent rolls
- 3/4 cup white sugar
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1/2 cup butter, room temperature
- 1/4 cup honey

Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Prepare a 9x13 inch baking dish with cooking spray
- 2. Beat the cream cheese with 1 cup of sugar and the vanilla extract in a bowl until smooth.
- 3. Unroll the cans of crescent roll dough, and use a rolling pin to shape each piece into 9x13 inch rectangles. Press one piece into the bottom of the 9x13 baking dish. Evenly spread the cream cheese mixture into the baking dish, then cover with the remaining piece of crescent dough. Stir together 3/4 cup of sugar, cinnamon, and butter. Dot the mixture over the top of the cheesecake.
- 4. Bake in preheated oven until the crescent dough has puffed and turned golden brown, about 30 minutes. Remove from the oven and drizzle with honey. Cool completely in the pan and cutting into 12 squares.

BARNES HOMEMAKERS COOKBOOK—1976 SWISS HAM NOODLES - Trudy Dittmer

Ingredients:

- 2 cups medium noodles (cooked)
- 2 Tbsp butter
- 2 Tbsp plus 1 tsp flour
- 3/4 tsp salt
- Dash of pepper
- 2 cups milk
- 1 cup cooked ham (diced)
- 1 cup Swiss cheese (diced)

Directions:

Cook noodles according to package directions. Drain. Melt butter. Remove from heat and blend in flour and seasonings. Gradually add milk, blending all of the time. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly until thick and smooth. Remove from heat. Add ham and cheese; add noodles.

Pour into 2 qt casserole and bake in 350 degree oven for 20 to 25 minutes or until bubbly and brown on top.

Makes 4-6 servings.

Ingredients:


- 5 cups diced fresh or frozen rhubarb

- 1 can (21 ounces) blueberry pie filling
- 1 pkg (6 ounces) raspberry gelatin

- In Dutch oven, combine rhubarb and water. Cook over medium-high heat for 4 minutes or until rhubarb is tender. Add sugar and bring to a boil. Boil for 2 minutes. Stir in pie filling.
- Remove from the heat; cool for 10 minutes. Add gelatin and mix well. Carefully ladle hot mixture into hot half-pint jars, leaving 1/4 inch headspace. Remove air bubbles, wipe rims and adjust lids. Process for 10 minutes in a boiling water canner.

PORK CHOPS OLE'

BITE SIZE BACON QUICHE

From The Crown of Southern Cooking

Ingredients:

- 5 strips bacon
- 1 stick unsalted butter, softened
- 3 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 1 cup all purpose flour
- 1 cup grated Swiss cheese
- 1 large egg, beaten
- 1/2 cup milk or cream
- 1/4 tsp salt

Paprika to garnish

Directions:

Fry bacon crisp, and drain.

In a bowl, cream butter and cream cheese. Add flour, and work it in with fingers. Roll dough in a ball, and chill. (this can be done a day ahead).

When ready to bake, lightly spray or butter miniature muffin tins. Divide dough into 24 balls, and press each one into a muffin cup and up the side a bit, making tiny pastry shells.

Place cheese in each shell, dividing it evenly and using it all. Crumble bacon, and put on top, using it all. Mix egg, milk and salt, then spoon mixture into each shell, using it all. Sprinkle each quiche with paprika.

Bake in preheated 350 degree oven 25-30 minutes. Serve


