

### TOWN OF BARNES—ANNUAL MEETING SUMMARY

#### New Town Chair Presides over Barnes Town Meeting

More than 50 registered voters and some other interested parties attended the annual Barnes town meeting on Tuesday, April 18th at the Barnes Town Hall. New town chairperson Christine Webb introduced new town Supervisor Zach Desrosiers and re-elected Supervisor Donna Porter along with continuing Supervisors Tom Emerson and Seana Frint.

Outgoing chairperson Tom Krob left with a positive message expressing thanks and best wishes for all the good people here. Clerk/Treasurer Judy Bourassa provided financial statements showing that the town's financial resources are stable and secure.

Highway Foreman Eric Altman gave an overview on the planned projects for the coming year including the work on Lake Road, new bocce ball courts, expansion of trails and services at the Tomahawk Lake Park, and more.

Town Constable Mike O'Keefe briefly summarized his year (96 calls, more than 5,000 miles driven), but stated that this will be his final term and focused on issues that need to be considered for the future regarding law enforcement. Co-coordinators have been found to run the Vatten Paddlar race, which will be held on July 8, 2017.

A motion requested the board to take a survey of property owners about the waterski/jetski ordinance, then leave the issue settled for 3 years rather than re-hashing it every year. There was a positive polite discussion on this issue including (but not limited to):

- there are community members who don't own lake property or are renters
- there are opinions on both sides
- the board is not allowed to set future agendas so cannot be bound by this resolution
- there have been petitions presented on each side and the board agreed to take this under advisement.

Other motions presented and passed:

- Setting Zach Desrosiers' salary at the transfer station (as required by law since he's now a town official)
- Allowing sale of some landlocked property to finance a corridor connecting the town park with the Tomahawk Lake park, authorizing the sale of property within the business park if necessary to attract appropriate businesses
- Creating a fund for the AIS (Aquatic Invasive Species) so they can use donated funds in another year
- Removing the elected Constable position to allow other options for 2019.

### Town of Barnes Aquatic Invasive Species Committee Update

The Town of Barnes Aquatic Invasive Species Committee had another very busy and productive year in 2016. The committee coordinated and monitored the Clean Boats Clean Waters (CBCW) program at 5 boat landings on 5 separate lakes in 2016. The paid and volunteer CBCW monitors logged in 2,112 hours, checked 3,729 boats for aquatic plants and animals and educated 9,128 boaters. A grant application for the CBCW program was submitted by the committee for 2017 and was approved in full. Tomahawk Lake was added to the 2017 CBCW grant.

The Shoreline Monitoring program coordinated by the AIS committee currently has 62 volunteers monitoring 27 lakes in the Barnes area for introductions of new invasive species. This group of volunteers logged in hundreds of hours in 2016.

Numerous volunteers invested over 450 hours of work to complete construction of the Barnes Aquatic Invasive Species Sucker (BAISS) boat. The BAISS boat will be used by the Town of Barnes to efficiently harvest invasive species from the town's lakes, minimizing the chance of spreading the aquatic plants which can occur with improper handling. Few communities in the state of Wisconsin own this type of harvester; it will provide our residents with a resource to remove invasive species before they become widespread.

A very competitive *Established Population Control Grant* application for Tomahawk and Sand Bar Lakes was completed by the AIS committee during this past winter. In April the Town of Barnes received the good news that the grant was awarded to the town in the amount of \$62,785 which will help pay for the project cost of \$92,331. The town's share will be \$29,545 which will be funded primarily by donations and volunteer work-in-kind. The goal of the committee is to treat both lakes this spring with a chemical to kill the Eurasian Water-milfoil and control any recurring with the BAISS boat in subsequent years. This grant would not have been awarded to the Town of Barnes without the ten year history of the TOB AIS committee's coordination of volunteers who performed lake surveys and monitored boat landings and shorelines. The efforts of committee members and citizens were critical in grant application ranking. Thank you to everyone who contributed and continues to contribute to the very important mission of maintaining our exceptional water clarity and keeping our lakes free of invasive species.

Grant extensions for George, Middle Eau Claire and Upper Eau Claire Lakes will be applied for this May. All of the TOB grants require vigilant monitoring by the committee and detailed paperwork from the town clerk to ensure we accurately document our expenses and volunteer hours. As a result the town's share of expenses is minimal or nothing.

Plans for the 2017 season include CBCW monitoring on Upper Eau Claire, Middle Eau Claire, Lower Eau Claire, Robinson, Island and Tomahawk Lakes, the chemical treatment of EWMF this spring on Tomahawk and Sand Bar Lakes, use of the BAISS boat in June to harvest Curly-leaf Pondweed on Upper and Middle Eau Claire Lakes and shoreline monitoring for invasive species on area lakes. We need more volunteers to help out on the BAISS boat, either as boat operators or divers.



# REMINISCING



### *By*: Julie Friermood Sarkauskas

Born and raised in Barnes, I never realized just how important the memories made were and what they would mean to me for the rest of my life. I grew up in a family that gave unconditional love and support: get up, go to school, go to work, come home to hot meals, warm hugs and then do it all over again. Countless good times and memories to share, many of them with families that are still around the area today. Many of us moved out of the area after high school, and most of us "knew" we would visit Barnes throughout our lives, but probably never live here again. Well, time and life have a way of changing our plans and have brought a lot of people back to Barnes to live, and some of us back for vacation and cabin living, but nonetheless back to Barnes.

I'd like to start the Reminiscing section by telling the Friermood family business story. Many of you, if not most of you, remember my dad, Bill Friermood and my uncle, Jerry Friermood.

All born to Blanche (Pease) and Darien Friermood, Bill, Jerry, Darold and Pat grew up in Barnes. Darold, Bill and Pat were born in Chicago with Jerry being born in Ashland. Blanche's father was Lucius Pease, the founder of Pease Resort. He married Laura Elvira Stocker (Blanche's mother) in 1891. Laura passed away while she and Lucius were still living at Balsam farm in Drummond north of Pitcher/Picture Lake, and eventually Lucius would ask Blanche to move back to help. Unfortunately, Darien wanted nothing to do with living in Barnes and he and Blanche would eventually divorce.

After high school, Bill went into the Navy during WWII, where he was a tail gunner. After his tour of duty, he ended up in California where he met the love of his life, Joyce White. Joyce was born in Flint, MI, and was 1 of 10 children. When she was 11 years old, her father passed away. Her mother gathered up the 5 children still at home (the 5 oldest boys were all in the service—imagine having 5 Service flags hanging in your kitchen window) and moved them to Elsinore, CA. Bill couldn't pass on his chance to have that little filly, so he married Joyce on New Year's Day in 1953.


The first 3 of 7 children born to Bill and Joyce were Shirley, Debbie and Gary, all born in Hemet, CA, before Mom and Dad moved back to Wisconsin. Rick, Jack, Julie and "li'l" Bill were all born in Ashland.

Bill's brother Jerry went to California after high school in 1950, and his first job was working in a service station. In 1954, Jerry moved back to Barnes and started construction on the service station, building it on a piece of land owned by his mother Blanche. It was then known as Jerry's Mobil Service (later changed to Friermood's Service).

In 1956, Bill and Joyce moved back to Barnes where Bill started working with Jerry at the service station. (Dad had been working at a service station for a few years in Elsinore, CA before he moved back).

In August of 1956, Viola Schwerin, Joyce's cousin, and her two younger sisters drove to Barnes from Michigan to visit Joyce. (Joyce didn't like the city so during the summers she would go north from Flint to the aunt's and uncle's farms around Pinconning, MI, one of them being Viola's family home) One night during Viola's visit, they were having drinks with friends at Mammoser's Sunset Resort (later named RuDell's). Jerry was bet \$50 that he would not marry Viola. Jerry and Viola drove to Crowne Point, Indiana, on August 21, 1956 and got married. They knew each other for less than a week, but there was no way Jerry was going to lose that bet. They had one son, Gregg, who many of you know.

The brothers could be counted on both during normal business hours during the cold dark nights of the 50 below winters or the muggy summer nights. We all remember well the phone ringing many times in the wee hours of the morning for someone who needed to be pulled out of the ditch or needed a frozen engine started.

In the fall of 1962, an Arctic Cat distributor from Neenah, WI, was driving around the area with two Arctic Cat snowmobiles looking for someone that would be interested in becoming an Arctic Cat dealer. He stopped in to discussed this with the brothers and they started selling the new 1963 Arctic Cat snowmobiles that winter. Because parts were hard to find, over several years many trips were made to Thief River Falls, MN. This is where the snowmobiles were manufactured. While there, they had to opportunity the test drive the new machines.



The station was a good place to stop for coffee and a chat. Dad would call it the "truth" palace. Don't think there was anything Dad couldn't fix, and he *loved* doing it.

They had the only Arctic Cat dealership in northern Wisconsin. At the time, the only other dealer was in Neenah, WI. Soon to follow, though, dealerships would pop up around the area.

### REMINISCING - continued

The first snowmobiles for Arctic Cat were red or red and white. Not until the 1966 Panther were the snowmobiles black. A handful of sleds for sale would be sitting outside the station, but not for long as the "want" for these machines grew rapidly.

In 1968, Bill and Jerry built an addition onto the existing service station that would be solely for housing more sleds to allow the public to stay warm and have a cup of coffee or a Coke out of the old red dispensing machines while they decided which model they just had to have next.

Along with that, of course, came the clothing, boots, stickers and posters. ("The Year of the Cat" sticker is still stuck to the rafters in the basement where the boys' bedroom was.) So, as the story goes, if you have a snowmobile you need to race it right !?!

In 1965, Jerry started racing for "Friermood's – Arctic Cat" just about every weekend in the local circuits. (Hayward, Turtle Lake, Iron River, Lake Nebagamon, and others). Snowmobiles that made the cut were of course the Tom Cat (How many of you remember that one?), Panther, Puma and many models of the EXT. But the favorite to race would be the mighty King Kat. However, my brother Bill and I crowned the "Kitty Kat" as the best racing machine. (Mostly because we could do diddy's easily and lift it up every time we got stuck!).

Unprofessionally, the boys would race on the airport, the lakes, and just about anywhere else they could get away with it. I loved giving it a try whenever I could, and at whatever speed I mustered up or had the guts to try (not as fast as I thought I'm sure!).

The business was a grand success, winning many awards for Arctic Cat sales and service. There were a couple of trips awarded, among them Cancun which was taken by Jerry and Viola and Hawaii which Bill and Joyce grabbed up

One of the "conversation pieces" around the area was the Arctic Cat head that my sister Debbie painted on the side of the new addition, a perfect rendition of the well-known emblem. SADLY, we lost Debbie in 2003.






Having the opportunity to ride these snowmobiles and experience how real trail riding used to be and of course the inevitable "poker run" is something I will always treasure. Without a doubt, being able to do all of that with my dad and brothers is an unexplainable memory to have.



Dad and Jerry decided to sell the service station and dealership in 1980. Dad had a stroke in 1984 which took him out of the public eye, so many people that have moved to the area since then didn't really know Dad and what he had contributed to the community. I'm lucky to be able to share the stories with you now.

Mom, Dad, Jerry and Viola are gone now, but the memories that the families, friends and community share are unsurpassable in our hearts. Thank you for sharing in our lives over the years and I look forward to being part of your lives once again.

### **100TH ANNIVERSARY OF PEASE RESORT—CELEBRATION AND FAMILY REUNION**

L.D. Pease arrived in Barnes by sleigh on April 10, 1916 to begin building Pease Resort on Upper Eau Claire Lake. 100 years (and a bit) later, in August 2016, his son David Pease held a family reunion to commemorate the occasion. About 35 family members came from near and far to meet at the Barnes VFW for a nice lunch, cake, stories and fun.

Pease Resort opened to guests in 1917 and operated until Elizabeth Pease (L.D.'s third wife) died in 1998. It was one of many small family-run resorts in this area which attracted fishermen, hunters and outdoor enthusiasts. Guests stayed in the main lodge at first and meals were served. Eventually there were 6 cabins with their own kitchens. Some of its interesting features included a tall waterslide which stood from the late 1920's to 1950, a lakeside gas pump from 1961 on, and a small cabin bar which opened in about 1938.

### ADMIRING RED ADMIRALS:

Sunshine warmed our backs and a cool breeze filtered through bike helmets as we turned onto the pavement for a ride around the lake. Before we could get up a head of steam, Drew called back, "Did you see that butterfly?" In a flash my bike was on the shoulder, my phone was out with the camera turned on, and I was running back to where he pointed.

I crept forward, struggling to discern the mottled brown underwings of a butterfly from the leaf litter. I must have gotten too close, because suddenly, in a flash of orange, white, and black, the butterfly rose and flitted erratically around a tree. My eyes darted along its wild flight path, and focused hard on the spot where it landed. Even knowing where I should look didn't help. The

butterfly's wings melted into the gravel and leaves pushed aside by the snowplow.

When I crept forward again, the butterfly startled and flapped its colorful wings deeper into the forest. I walked back to my bike. The elation of seeing my first butterfly of the year, combined with sunshine and a tailwind, inspired fast pedaling and a joyful ride. But a mystery gnawed at me, too. As far back as I can remember, Mourning Cloak butterflies have been the first to dance along on my early spring outings. Their deep-purple wings with yellow edging have brightened my day many times.

Mourning Cloaks overwinter in the Northwoods as adults, I'd learned, and I was astounded that such a delicate thing could survive our harshest season. Just like wood frogs and spring peepers, they have the advantage of waking up right near their breeding habitat, ready to go.

Paging through my <u>Kaufman Guide to Butterflies of North America</u>, though, I'd decided I must have seen a Red Admiral butterfly. What does it do in the winter? I realized that besides the Mourning Cloak and the charismatic, migratory, Monarch butterfly, I had no specific knowledge about how butterflies spend the winter

Happily, my Google search quickly turned up a wonderful <u>document from UW-Extension</u> listing the winter survival strategies of common Wisconsin butterflies. As with most things in nature, there's no single answer. Butterflies can overwinter as eggs, newly-hatched caterpillars, mid-stage caterpillars (this seems most common), mature caterpillars, pupae, hibernating adults, or migrating adults.

I also found a page on **wisconsinbutterflies.org** where butterfly enthusiasts post their most recent sightings. So far this spring, people have spotted Mourning Cloaks, Eastern Commas, Gray Commas, Compton Tortoiseshells, and Red Admirals

The first four species on that list all overwinter here as adults. As the autumn days shorten, antifreeze chemicals start building up in their body fluids. This happens for all the species who overwinter in the north, regardless of whether they chill as an egg, larva, pupa, or adult. Glycerol prevents ice crystals from growing and rupturing cells, even at temperatures well below freezing. So the adults tuck in behind loose bark, into crevices, or beneath logs, to sit out my favorite season.

In spring, these adults obviously have a jump on everyone else. They don't need to hatch, or grow, or metamorphose. They are ready to go. By basking in the sun and shivering their flight muscles, butterflies can raise their body temperature up to the 80 degrees F needed for flight, even while I'm still wearing my warmest cycling gloves.

Red Admirals, like the one I saw, may have a different tactic...or maybe not. At least in the southern parts of their range (which extends from Guatemala to Canada), adults and pupae hibernate. How far north they can survive the winter seems to be up for debate, and the line could be shifting. The parts of their range where Red Admirals don't survive the winter must be recolonized each spring by migrants from the south. The UW-Extension document asserts that our Red Admirals fly back and forth from south Texas.

Over the summer, Red Admirals have two generations. The summer brood is large and showy, with brighter colors, and a coming-of-age in July. Those butterflies produce a smaller, drabber, winter form, which we can see from late August through the first frosts. Just like with Monarchs, the winter form, although flighted, is not reproductively mature. They have a metabolism that allows them to pack away fat stores for migration and/or hibernation.

They'd better have some fat left in reserve when they arrive up north in April! I've seen flowers blooming, but only if you expand your image of a flower to include catkins, the miniscule petals on hazelnut bushes, and a few other tiny tree flowers. Early butterflies do not arrive to a beautiful buffet. As anyone with a sugarbush knows, though, sweet liquid is plentiful if you know where to look. Conveniently, Mourning Cloaks may actually prefer tree sap to nectar.

With the early snowmelt, I've been road biking a lot. It's been easy to go fast while the forests are still quiet and gray. If this butterfly (and the loons, cranes, ducks, and frogs) are any indication, though, my rides are about to encounter many more distractions!



### TIME CHANGE for Medicare 101 Presentations!

In January 2017, the Bayfield County Elder Benefits Specialist, Sheila Mack, began providing "Medicare 101" presentations once per month, January through September, throughout Bayfield County. The presentations had started at 3:00 p.m. and lasted up to 2 hours, but due to audience feedback, the remaining presentations, beginning with April's presentation, will start at **6:00 p.m**. and last up to 2 hours, depending upon the information reviewed and questions asked by those attending the presentation. Hopefully this will be more convenient for attendees. Also, refreshments will be served.

These presentations will introduce you to the basics of Medicare and give you the information you need to know before making any decisions about whether you want to enroll in all parts of Medicare at age 65, some parts of Medicare, or none of them; and the possible consequences of not enrolling when you are first eligible to enroll. You will also learn about the three types of insurance that supplement Medicare because Medicare only pays 80% of hospital and medical costs, and the need for creditable prescription drug coverage either through Medicare Part D, Wisconsin SeniorCare, or a Medicare Advantage Plan.

If you will be turning 65 this year, attending one of these trainings is strongly encouraged. The time available for the Elder Benefit Specialist to work with you in the office is becoming more and more limited due to the increase in assistance being requested. In order to provide prompt and efficient service to as many clients as possible, this presentation will provide basic information on Medicare in a group setting rather than one on one in the Elder Benefit Specialist office. This training will give you enough information to understand your options and be ready to make decisions when it is time to do so.

### Arctic Cat Snowmobile article from 1975

(from snowmobile poster shown in the reminiscing section)

Arctic's come a long way since its birth in 1962.

Back then, the top of the line was called the model 500. It sported an automotive-type steering wheel – forward and reverse gears – and if you could look past the roller chain track (which, rumor has it, was borrowed from a hay baler) you found a solid-maple skid frame.

You bet by today's standards it was plenty primitive. But even the old Model 500 was born with a slide rail – and that said Arctic wasn't going to be satisfied with playing follow the leader.

During the next three years, design innovation became second nature with Arctic engineers. They moved the engine up front – and tucked it under a fiberglass hood. The devised a rubber track with steel cleats. And introduced a 2cycle engine.

Then, in 1966, the Cat really came of age. It was the year of the Panther – and with it, the first riveted, aluminum chassis. The first low, forward mounted engine. The first canted skis. The first leaf-spring front suspension. The first torsion spring slide rail suspension.

It was the year of the first totally integrated snowmobiling system – ad it clearly established Arctic's engineering dominance.

Since '66, *Cats* have just kept getting better and better. We've improved our improvements, then improved 'em some more.

Like now, in '75, this is the year of the Gripper, the *Cat's* new track. It combines the best of both rubber and steel. Rubber pads to reach out and grep ice or hard pack and steel cleats for maximum thrust in deep powder.

Yep, there's been a whole lot of changes since that first Model 500. But listen, one thing's always stayed the same. One sled's always led the way. And year after year it's the *Cat.*

### JUNEBERRY PIE - submitted by Paula Greenspan

This is David Pease's favorite and our family takes Juneberry pie seriously. We begin the process by keeping our eyes peeled for the white blossoming shrubs (5' to 8' tall) as we drive around in mid-May, and trying to remember where we see them. Then, if we're lucky enough not to get a hard frost, we return to those spots in early July, just before the wild blueberries are ripe. Juneberries freeze well and we always try to put some away for winter treats. They look a lot like blueberries but are a bit drier and less sweet, with a slightly different flavor. If I'm a bit short on Juneberries, I toss some wild blueberries in to make up the difference and no one ever complains. As with wild blueberries, make sure to sort and wash your berries well.

Ingredients:

2 9" pie crusts (your favorite recipe, or premade)
4 cups berries (I tend to use heaping cups)
3/4 cup sugar
1/4 cup minute tapioca
1 Tbsp lemon juice
1/8 tsp cinnamon
1 Tbsp butter

Preheat oven to 400 F

Mix fruit (fresh or frozen) with sugar, tapioca, lemon juice, and cinnamon. Let it stand for 10-15 minutes while you prepare the crust. Then assemble your pie by placing the berry mixture inside, dotting it with the butter, and adding a top crust or lattice. Bake 45-60 minutes. It's done when the crust is browned and the juices are forming bubbles that burst slowly. Let cool 30-60 minutes before serving. We like ours warm with vanilla ice cream but we also like it at room temperature with real whipped cream.
