Saturday would bring on and off storms with extreme thunder, lightening and torrential rains. By Sunday morning, June 17th, much of our town was under water. Very lucky in our case, Thanks Mom! 7 trees down in the back but nothing around the house. Others, unfortunately did not fare so well. Birch Lake Road had MANY trees that were down or snapped in half. Bayfield Electric customers and some Dahlberg customers were without power late Sunday afternoon into the evening from downed trees over power lines. DID YOU KNOW ...



Anyone born on or after January 1, 1989 is required to complete a boating safety course to legally operate a motorized boat or personal watercraft on Wisconsin waters AND Paddle Boarders must have a life jacket on the board (preferably being worn).

****** PUBLIC NOTICE *****

Barnes residents and guests who wish to display fireworks on their property (owned or rented) must have a valid fireworks permit issued by the town of Barnes. Only fireworks that are purchased in Wisconsin are legal to be displayed. Permits issued will be on file with the Fire Department, Constable, DNR, and the Sheriff's Department. Proof of insurance/bond will be required at time of application.

FIREWORKS ARE PERMITTED IN THE TOWN OF BARNES ONLY DURING THE TIME PERIOD OF ONE (1) WEEK BEFORE THE FOURTH OF JULY AND ONE (1) WEEK AFTER THE FOURTH OF JULY AND FOR DESIGNATED SPECIAL EVENTS. Display hours are from dusk to 11:30 p.m. ONLY and will be strictly enforced. Violators will be subject to a possible fine and confiscation of the fireworks.

Permits are issued by the Barnes Town Clerk/Treasurer during regular office hours. You must apply in person at least two days prior to purchasing and using your fireworks.

CLEAN BOATS CLEAN WATERS

As we begin the 2018 boating season, I'd like to remind you of some checklist items.

- Be sure the correct number of lifejackets are in your boat.
- Make sure the plug is in your boat before backing down the ramp.
- Inspect, drain and clean all boats and gear of weeds, mud and water. This includes water toys such as rafts, tubes and skis as well as kayaks and canoes.

Do not add lake water to leeches and minnows. If you add lake water you are required by law to only use them on that body of water.

If you have some extra time, please consider spending a couple hours at a boat landing. Hours include weekdays, not just weekends. Thank you for your efforts and support to keep our lakes clean and safe for the next generation. - Sally Pease (Text: 715-559-0614)

Paddle Board Safety Tips:

- Wear a lifejacket! More than 90% of boat fatalities related to drowning involve victims not wearing life jackets, you need one for your safety. You also need one because Wisconsin law, as well as U.S. Coast Guard law, treats paddleboards the same as kayaks and canoes. This means there must be a personal flotation device for each person on board. However, the best way to obey this law and to ensure your safety is to just wear the life jacket.
- Carry a whistle
- Be a competent swimmer
- Know how to self-rescue
- Know how to tow another board
- Know the local regulations and navigation rules
- Understand the elements and hazards winds, tidal ranges, current, terrain
- Know when to wear a leash
- Be defensive don't go where you aren't supposed to be and avoid other swimmers, boaters, paddleboards
- Use proper blade angle to be the most efficient paddle boarder
- take a safety course, <u>Paddling Safety Course [exit DNR]</u>

The Declaration of Independence in Modern English

We also believe that if the government fails to protect the rights of its people that the people have the right to change the government. The government can be totally changed if it needs to be. This happens so that everyone can be happy and safe. Changing the government is no joking matter because sometimes things have been the way they are for a long time. Even though sometimes people continue to put up with a government that doesn't operate correctly, it doesn't make it right and changes still need to be made. It is the duty of the people to make sure that the government treats the people fairly and civilly.

We, those who have been putting up with an inoperable government, have been patient and suffered through a lot of things without complaining, but it is our duty to make the needed changes.

This King of Great Britain is King George III. He is our present ruler, and he wants to become even stronger. He has already tried to rule us completely, without listening to what our American leaders have to say. And we have proof of such evils. Here are the facts for the whole world to see:

- The King has gone a little crazy. He has refused to sign laws that our leaders have written. These are pretty important laws.
- The King has taken control of the Judges in our court system. Judges cannot be fair if someone else is controlling their jobs and how much money they make.
- The King has also ignored the laws of our American government. He has created his own set of laws and now feels that he has a right to force us to give food and shelter to British soldiers, stop us from trading with the rest of the world, and has set up too many taxes for us that we have no choice in paying. WISCONSIN BOATING LAWS

UNLAWFUL OPERATION WISCONSIN LAW STATES THAT THESE DANGEROUS OPERATING PRACTICES ARE ILLEGAL:

- Steering toward another object or person in the water and swerving at the last possible moment in order to avoid collision
- Chasing, harassing, or disturbing wildlife with your vessel
- · Operating a vessel repeatedly in a circuitous manner within 200 feet of another vessel or person in the water
- Operating a vessel within 100 feet of the shoreline, any dock, raft, pier, or restricted area on any lake at greater than "slow, no wake speed"
- Operating a vessel at greater than "slow, no wake speed" within 100 feet of a swimmer, unless a vessel is assisting a swimmer
- Operating a motorboat, other than a Personal Water Craft, at a speed in excess of "slow, no wake speed" within 100 feet of the shoreline of any lake
- A PWC may not be operated between sunset and sunrise
- A PWC may not be operated at faster than "slow, no wake speed" within:
- 100 feet of any other vessel on any waterbody, including a vessel that is towing a person on water skis, inner tube, wakeboard, or similar device, or operating within 100 feet of the tow rope or person being towed
- 200 feet of shore on any lake
- 100 feet of a dock, pier, raft, or restricted area on any lake
- Steering toward another object or person in the water and swerving at the last possible moment in order to avoid collision
- Chasing, harassing, or disturbing wildlife with a PWC

Around me, the damage would be to Pease Road at James Road as well as Tars Pond Road. Sunday morning at 7:30 Mac McCaughn (Peggy (Pease's husband) and I took a ride down the hill to see what the damage might be. (a tip from Sally Pease) The water was flowing over the road like Niagra Falls. What most people do NOT know, is that although never to this extreme, winter snow melt and heavy rains have been rising and going over this part of the road for hundreds of years. The water would come from Hyatt Creek, Fletcher Creek, Tars Pond through Tars Creek into Dry Pond and to Pease Road. It would rise, pass over the road and settle on the other side leaving little damage disturbance.

Volunteer Boat Landing Monitors Needed Due to Severe Shortage By Ted Eastlund

Boat landing monitors on Upper, Middle and Lower Eau Claire Lakes, Tomahawk and Robinson Lakes play an important role in reinforcing state laws preventing the transport of aquatic plants and lake water from lake to lake.

The DNR-funded Clean Boats-Clean Waters Program of the Barnes Aquatic Invasive Species Committee provides funds for hiring boat landing monitors but only if we provide volunteer hours to match 25% of the paid staff hours.

According to Lee Wiesner, Town of Barnes AIS Committee Chair, we are so short of volunteers that we are matching at a rate of 6.8% and this threatens our ability to acquire future continued funding. This summer we have not been able to provide boat landing monitoring at the level needed because of the shortage. Many hours on weekends, the busiest use of the boat landings, are left unstaffed.

Most data point to motor boats and boat trailers as the source of the Eurasian Water Milfoil that has infested Tomahawk, Sandbar and George Lakes and the invasive Curlyleaf Pondweed that has hit Upper and Middle Eau Claire Lakes along with the Eau Claire River from where it starts at Middle to above the lock & dam as it drains toward Lower Eau Claire Lake.

The largest patches of the invasive Eurasian Water Milfoil ai Tomahawk Lake is directly in front of and near the boat landing. The only really massive patches of invasive Curly Leaf Pondweed in Middle Eau Claire Lake are in directly in front of the public boat landing. Despite mechanical, suction removal of much of one patch, using the Barnes BAISS pontoon boat from 8am to noon daily during June, 2017, curly leaf pondweed spread to multiple other sites in Middle Eau Claire Lake and to the Eau Claire River. We need to fully staff the boat landing monitor positions to prevent further introduction of invasive species. Careful removal of all aquatic plants and lake water watercraft leaving the lakes and reminders by the presence of boat landing monitors is a key preventive step relied upon to halt further spread.

MYSTERY SOLVED !!! Detail Provided By: Carol Lebreck

CONGRATULATIONS to Teresa & Gary Scharlau & Marie Hughes for successfully solving the mystery: Can You "GUESS WHO'S COMING to BARNES"? The "SPECIAL GUEST", who will arrive in Barnes in late summer or early fall, is none other than the "FAMOUS SILVER BEACH ELK"...discovered by young swimmers back in 2005 in the shallow waters in front of the Ruprecht's Silver Beach Resort on Middle Eau Claire Lake!

<u>Clue #1: He last visited our area back in 2005</u>. That's when the elk was discovered, after being hidden in the lake bed for 500-600 years.

<u>Clue #2: He still has a number of relatives in the area.</u> That's because, although elk disappeared in Wisconsin circa 1867, a small herd of about 25 were recently re-introduced into the Clam Lake area in 1995.

<u>Clue #3: He has always been known for having rather amazing headwear</u>. The Silver Beach Elk's "headwear" was discovered along with a significant number of bones. His antlers measure approximately 6 ft x 4 ft x 2 ft and they truly are "amazing" (see photo with Quentin Ruprecht).

Clue #4: In his younger days, he was a frequent visitor to the Middle Eau Claire Lake. Even 300 years ago, early explorers reported an abundance of elk, and historic records indicate elk were present in 72 of WI counties.

Clue #5: Although he was severely injured in a hunting accident a number of years ago, incredible efforts are being made (or have been made over the years) to help him return to Barnes. Careful study of the elk's bones have provided evidence of "kill" marks, as well as several "butchering marks".

<u>Clue #6: It's been said that IF he finds a home in Barnes that could accommodate him, he may well become a</u> <u>permanent resident</u>. Since the discovery of the elk, BAHA had hoped to have a museum which could house the elk. After the museum opened in 2016, the effort to get permission from the WI Historical Society to bring the elk's remains back to Barnes as a permanent exhibit in the museum was renewed...and permission has now been granted!

<u>Clue #7: Although he is still considering his final plans, he has confirmed that he will arrive in Barnes sometime</u> <u>during the 2018 summer season</u>. The elk's bones are being treated at UW-Milwaukee to ensure their long-term preservation and protection and final plans for the Silver Beach Elk Exhibit and "Homecoming Celebration" are underway.

The yardstick gives you some idea of "scale" of these bones. Information I received about the size/weight of the antlers a graduate student involved in the study. "Dr. Hudson and I were able to measure and weigh the antlers. They are 25 lbs total (15 lbs for the left antler, 10 lbs for the right antler). If they're laid out as in the picture to the right, the total span is about 6 feet by 4 feet.

Early on, as the bones were being discovered little by little, Quentin Ruprecht stored them "safely submerged in water" (maybe in a boat of some kind in his garage). After they were all found, they were transported to the UW-Milwaukee, Dept of Anthropology, in the care of Jean Hudson, who helped with the "dig" and documentation. They have been there for these past 12+ years. The bones were never stored in the hands of the WI Historical Society in Madison, however, they were technically the "property" of the State Historical Society since they were discovered in the "lake bed"...which is considered "state property".

The Barnes Museum has since been granted permission to receive the bones by the WI Historical Society and we expect have them here yet this summer or fall. My efforts and correspondence to bring back the bones and antlers has been with Jean Hudson (and one of her grad students, Rebekah, who was assisting with the research related to the elk and the indigenous people who lived at that time) and John Broihahn, the WI Historical Society State Archaeologist.

BEWARE OF SWIMMERS ITCH

Swimmer's itch is a rash usually caused by an allergic reaction to parasites that burrow into your skin while you're swimming or wading in warm water. This parasite lives part of its life in snails and part of its life in ducks. There are already reported cases this season.

BAHA to Publish Book of MacQuarrie's Milwaukee Journal Columns

BAHA is pleased to be able to bring some of Gordon MacQuarrie's writings to new readers. Gordon MacQuarrie wrote for the Milwaukee Journal from 1936-1956, and is acknowledged as the first professional newspaper outdoor writer. He is also acknowledged as one of the best. Mac wrote about 3000 columns, under his heading of "Right Off the Reel". Most of his columns were news of the day, dog trials, season rules, conservation squabbles. But he managed to sneak in some "drivel" here and there, stories that were just plain fun to read. Many of these were in effect first drafts for stories that we know from outdoor magazines of the day. Others were found only on the Milwaukee Journal sports page, but they are equally as entertaining.

This new book "Right Off The Reel" contains 84 columns in 200 pages. There are chapters on Mister President (Al Peck), Conservationists including Aldo Leopold and Sig Olson, and of special interest to our readers, the cabin on Middle Eau Claire and hijinks with Mac's neighbors.

This book was compiled and edited by friend of BAHA Dave Evenson, and illustrated by Adam Nyhus. Keith Crowley, who wrote the biography of Gordon MacQuarrie and also collected many of the MacQuarrie items found in the BAHA Museum wrote the forward for this book. It will be a handsome book with its cover featuring a still life of some of those MacQuarrie items, photo taken by Keith Crowley.

In the cool of the evening he sang in Gaelic for me: "Flora MacDonald's Lament;" "Highland Mary;" "The March of the Cameron Men," and a song about "a pretty little brown girl," which goes in Gaelic as near as I can put it down in English "a ray mi newandown voyak, - a ree mi newandown voyak, a ray mi newandown voyak, oh foss me-a koo."....

An awesome sight to see when you drive by the Barnes Museum on Cty Hwy N and Lake Road. Jack Gribble has been working on this boat since late May, 2018. Its story is one to be told!



Unrolling the birchbark which was stored in a roll.



Jack is splitting roots, gathered from a swamp, to be used as lacing.



A construction frame is used to form the bark around. It will be removed later.



The bark is formed into shape around the frame and held in place with stakes.



The canoe is tipped up to allow for easy access.



Jack is sewing the gunwales. The bark sides are sandwiched between 2 layers of wood.



The bark has had boiling water poured on to soften it at the ends, and these wooden "clothespins" hold it in the desired shape to harden into place.

Jack Gribble has been building a birchbark canoe by hand in an early Ojibwa style. Jack has previously built 3 other birchbark canoes. When finished he will donate the resulting canoe to the museum for display.

Jack began putting together the canoe in late May, having already collected materials such as spruce gum, birch bark (taken from living trees, which <u>do</u> survive if done correctly), roots from tamarack and black spruce, and cedar for the gunwales and other structure.

He expects to finish about the second week of July. Visitors are welcomed and encouraged to stop by to observe and ask questions, most days 8:30 to 4:00 until the canoe is done.

JULY REMINISCING - BARNES TOWN HALL

According to "A Breath of Fresh Air", \$200 was allocated in the very first Barnes budget for building a town hall. This was the location of the first Post Office in Barnes. Since then, the town hall has been relocated, a new one built, had some small fires, repaired, expanded and changed in many ways. The town clerk used to work at a desk in the center of a small raised area, surrounded by a rail. Town offices later moved to an expansion at the rear of the building, and then to their present location in a separate building behind the older one.

The Barnes Town Hall is still the center of lots of activity as it has been for many years. These days, according to the calendar posted in the town office, it is used for town meetings and hearings, elections, and meetings of groups such as the AIS (Aquatic Invasive Species), Friends of the Eau Claire Lakes, Garden Club, and UFO Crafters. Senior meals are served there 4 days a week and a small group gathers to play cards on Thursdays.

WITC-sponsored classes are often held there on various topics, including yoga, Zumba,

opera appreciation, and (upcoming) Movies as Storytelling. It's available for rental for private functions (bridal showers, family reunions, etc.) but no alcohol is permitted. Occasionally there are other public events such as a craft bazaar or historical lecture.

Diane Rupnow, RN is available there most Thursdays from 10:00 am to 11:30 am to do free blood pressure & pulse checks, as she has been doing for more than 20 years. She's also happy to check your personal blood pressure machine by comparing it to the results she gets on her equipment. I'd add that she seems to lower my pressure just with her pleasant manner.

I've interviewed a number of long-term residents and they each have their own memories from years past. One person said they remembered going to more funerals than weddings there but had been to both. Pancake breakfasts are another event that used to be held there.

Various holiday celebrations have been popular. Back in the 1940s and into the 1970's, a large Christmas party was held by the Barnes Homemakers. They decorated a big tree, provided refreshments, and Santa visited to give every child a gift of candies and fresh fruit or a popcorn ball. Julie (Friermood) Sarkauskas remembers the Homemakers also hosted Christmas luncheons for their members. The Drummond High School select Choir would sing Christmas Carols during the luncheons. "They would call them 'Christmas Teas' when we sang".

Halloween Parties were a favorite of children from perhaps the 60s to the 90s including costume contests, games, and treats. Julie also recalls, the Drummond High School Juniors and Seniors would host Halloween Carnivals in the gym at the school in the early 70's.

Mentioning dances at the town hall brought smiles, happy memories, and interesting stories. Back in the 40s and 50s, there were regular evening dances with live music. Waltzes and polkas were favored, and Frankie Meinke remembers sitting on the benches as a child to watch. She believes they were the same benches that still grace our current building. Sandwiches and coffee were available for refreshments, but some folks made lengthy visits to their car where perhaps they sipped a little something harder. A smoking room was at the back of the hall, but teens used it to "hang out" away from the scrutiny of parental eyes.

There was always a Hunters Dance on the Saturday night of deer season which got "kind of wild." One year, two hunters had a fight about a deer which they both claimed to have shot. There was blood on the floor but the band kept on playing.

In the 1960s, school dances and movie nights were held there. Blanche Friermood had to clean up after the kids and didn't enjoy it as they weren't very tidy. Activities were curtailed after one high spirited participant (John X) broke the outside lights.

Julie Sarkauskas told of "Sock-Hops" and "Teen Dances" in the mid-70's. "There were quite a few of us that would get a little dancing in. Back then of course, you didn't have cell phones and texting. Some of us weren't allowed to be on the phone since we just saw our friends during the school day, but a great way to catch up in the summer time. Thinking back on record players and vinyl records makes you feel young again. I hope this sparks some memories in the old gang. (Feels like looking back on the little rascals.) We had a lot to do around town, we just had to find it. We're thankful we had the Town Hall and parents that helped it happen."



In a more wholesome topic, I heard of various religious gatherings that have been hosted by the town hall. In the 1960s, Sunday school for children was held there weekly from Easter to Christmas. A minister came from a nearby town (I variously heard Solon Springs, Poplar, and Wentworth – could have been all of those at different times), and he may have also given a short sermon before the Sunday School. At a later point, the late 60's and 70's, there was Vacation Bible School for a week or two in the summers.

In the 1970s, there were Catholic services hosted weekly at the Town Hall, summers only. In good weather, so many people came that they had to open the windows and arrange more benches outside for them.

MUSEUM NEWS We need your help!

The Barnes Area Historical Association has a major project beginning this year that will require a lot of effort and financial resources. We plan to establish a "Heritage Village" on the grounds of the Museum. We have the opportunity to acquire two historic buildings, the Pease School, and the Kaufman family log cabin. We intend to make these two buildings the centerpiece of a Heritage Village.

We envision that through preservation and replication, the village will be expanded with buildings and their cultural content. With exhibits and volunteers, perhaps in period costumes, BAHA will present educational programs so visitors may experience the rural simplicity of small town life in the early days of Barnes. We also want to educate children through interpretation and participation with enthusiastic retelling of the history of that time.

As more items are acquired, and through replicating fronts that resemble buildings that once stood in Barnes, we hope to have an extensive representation that will bring to life Barnes as it once was. There is ample room on the Museum property for the extended vision we have for the Village.

THE PEASE SCHOOL

The old Pease School is now located on Pease Road, and has been there since when it was moved in 1939. The one room school represented the design of schools of that period. It was originally built in the 1920s as the McNeil School located at the northern boundary of Barnes, half way between Barnes and Iron River on County Road A. It was used for teaching grades one through eight. It was named after Miles McNeil, the owner of a nearby far m. The depression of the 1930s and droughts bankrupt many farmers, and many of them moved away. Consequently, the school closed in 1937 and was vacant for two years.

Around the time the McNeil School was established, a school was started in 1924 in one of the Pease Resort cedar log cabins on the Upper Eau Claire Lake.



The resort, established in 1916 by L. D. Pease, rented the cabins during the summer months, but between Labor Day and Memorial Day the wall between its two bedrooms was removed and it became the Pease School.

Typically, five to fifteen students attended each year. Born in 1928, Dave Pease attended the school starting in 1933. Dave remembered Helen Bergen as his first grade teacher. Subsequent teachers at the school were Tracy Gullickson, Linda Wanamaki and June Hall, a Barnes native in her 20s. In 1939, the School District paid to move the McNeil school to its current location, and a "real" schoolhouse was then to become the Pease School.

The building has been donated to BAHA by the current owners, Doug & Carol Westerberg. They plan to build a new home on the property and retire to Barnes. If we had not agreed to accept their generous offer, the schoolhouse would have had to be torn down. We feel that it should be preserved and the presence on the Museum grounds would enhance our ability to provide educational events and space for additional displays. The Museum building can always use more space, and the school would help with that.

To accept the school, we obviously have to move it and have it become the first piece of our plans for the Heritage Village. We envisioned having a grouping of buildings and replicas of what buildings in Barnes looked like years ago. We would lay them out on History Street on the Museum property, which provides plenty of room.

To accomplish this task, this is where your help is important. We have established the Heritage Village Committee, tasked with the job of planning, fundraising and developing the project. There are significant costs to install a foundation, move the school, and then begin restoring it to similar to what is was like when it was an active school.

The costs to put the school on site with a slab and foundation, footings for the porch, creating access under power lines, and some outside repairs are estimated to be \$16,525.00. When on site, we would re-roof it, with the present owners generously offering to provide the shingles. We hope to get volunteer help to do that, but if we cannot, there would be an estimated cost to re-roof of approximately \$4,000.00. We will also need approximately \$6,500.00 to renovate the interior of the school and install utilities.

The timetable of the project is to begin to install the foundation or basement by August 15th, and then move the school in late September to mid-October.

The Heritage Village Project has raised \$3,145.00 as of this writing. We need to raise about \$4,355.00 more by August 1st, and the remaining \$9,025.00 needed this year by September 15th to move the building on site. The costs required for the remaining work could be raised in 2019.

MUSEUM NEWS—continued:

THE KAUFMAN FAMILY CABIN

The costs estimated to do the move and the work needed to restore the log cabin are approximately \$11,875.00. If money is available this year to do this part of the project, we would begin this as well. If not, it would become part of next year's work.

Another historic building that has been donated to us is the log cabin that the Kaufman family was raised in, dating back to the late 1800s. The building has been donated to us by the Barnes family, and is the home that Gretchen Barnes, wife of Stanley Barnes, grew up in.





PROJECT SUMMARY

So, in summary, we need your help with the funding of the total project. The Heritage Village is seeking financial help through Fundraising Events, Grants and other Charitable Foundations, but that takes time and we cannot count on any specific amount. It will take significant donations to reach the goals of the project, and much of it by this summer.

Current members of the Heritage Village Committee are; Ted Eastlund, Carol Andresen, John Amend, Carol Lebreck, Fred Barnes and Larry Bergman. We are asking you for your help with these important contributions. Obviously, large donations are needed, but any amount is welcomed and appreciated.

To recap the funding needs and timing, the targeted total for the two buildings is going to be about \$40,000.00, of which we have raised \$3,145.00 to date. So, \$4,355.00 is needed by 8/1/2018, and \$9,025.00 is needed by 9/15/2018 to move the school this year. The balance of funding can be raised over the next year. If more funds are available sooner than next year, we will accelerate the project.

If you can help us with this important project, contact any Committee Member and they will help you. Volunteer help with the roofing and log cabin wood foundation is also welcomed and is considered a donation. We will issue a fundraising progress report every month in the News & Notes. The Museum has been met with popular success since its opening in 2016, and this project will bring the preservation of the history of Barnes to a new level of displays and educational opportunity. Please consider helping BAHA. We thank you in advance!

Medicare 101

Beginning in January 2018, the Bayfield County Elder Benefits Specialist, Sheila Mack, will be providing "Medicare 101" presentations once per month, January through September, throughout Bayfield County. These presentations will introduce you to the basics of Medicare and give you the information you need to know before making any decisions about whether you want to enroll in all parts of Medicare at age 65, some parts of Medicare, or none of them; and the possible consequences of not enrolling when you are first eligible to enroll. You will also learn about the three types of insurance that supplement Medicare because Medicare only pays 80% of hospital and medical costs, and the need for creditable prescription drug coverage either through Medicare Part D or Wisconsin Senior Care.

If you will be turning 65 this year, attending one of these trainings is strongly encouraged. The time available for the Elder Benefit Specialist to work with you in the office is becoming more and more limited due to the increase in assistance being requested. To provide prompt and efficient service to as many clients as possible, this presentation will provide basic information on Medicare in a group setting rather than one on one in the Elder Benefit Specialist office. This training will give you enough information to understand your options and be ready to make decisions when it is time to do so.

CHEESY GARLIC ROASTED ASPARAGUS From: Posted on Facebook

Ingredients

- 1 pound asparagus spears, woody ends removed
- 3 Tbsp olive oil
- 1 Tbsp minced garlic (or 4 cloves garlic, minced) 3/4 tsp Kosher salt
- 1/4 tsp fresh cracked black pepper
- 1 1/4 cup shredded mozzarella cheese

Directions:

- Preheat oven to 425 degrees
- Lightly grease a baking sheet with nonstick cooking oil spray.
- Arrange asparagus on baking sheet. Set aside.
- In a small bowl mix together olive oil, garlic, salt and pepper.
- Drizzle the oil mixture over the asparagus and toss to . evenly coat.
- Bake for 10-15 minutes until vibrant and just beginning to get tender.
- Remove from oven and top with the mozzarella cheese. Return to oven and broil (or grill) until the cheese melts and becomes golden (about 4-5 minutes).

RHUBARB DUMP CAKE

MOZZARELLA STUFFED MEATLOAF

Ingredients:

- 1 pound ground beef (85%)
- 1 cup bread crumbs
- 1 tsp dried basil
- 1 tsp dried oregano
- 1 tsp dried parsley
- 1 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp black pepper
- 1/2 cup milk
- 2 TB worcestershire sauce
- 8 oz fresh mozzarella, sliced
- 1 cup ketchup
- 1/4 cup brown sugar, tightly packed
- 1 TB worcestershire sauce
- 1 TB red wine vinegar
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed

1/8 tsp salt

pinch cayenne pepper

Directions:

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly grease a glass . baking pan (9x13) with nonstick cooking spray.
- In a large mixing bowl combine ground beef, bread • crumbs, basil, oregano, parsley, salt, pepper, milk, and Worcestershire sauce.
- Knead until combined. .
- Divide meat in half. Shape one half of the meat into the bottom half of the loaf and place in prepared pan. Place mozzarella slices down the center, leaving $\frac{1}{2}$ inch around the ends and sides.
- Shape remaining half of meat as the top half of the • loaf, sealing the edges.
- This is a free-form loaf so it doesn't need to be • perfect.
- In a small mixing bowl whisk together ketchup, • brown sugar, Worcestershire sauce, red wine vinegar, garlic, salt, and cayenne pepper.
- Pour half of this mixture over the meatloaf, reserving the remaining half for later.
- Bake in the preheated oven for 45 minutes. .
- After 45 minutes, remove from oven and pour the • remaining sauce over the loaf. Increase temperature to 400 degrees and bake for an additional 15 minutes.
- Let rest 5 to 10 minutes before serving.

HOBO DINNER FOIL PACKETS From:

Ingredients:

- 1 lb lean ground beef
- 1 package dry onion soup mix
- 4 small potatoes peeled and sliced
- 2 cups carrots chopped
- 1 large or 2 small onions, sliced
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- salt & pepper to taste

1 can condensed mushroom soup

Directions:

- Preheat oven to 375 degrees F.
- Combine ground beef and dry soup mix in a bowl.
- Form into four patties and set aside.
- In a large bowl combine all remaining ingredients except mushroom soup. Toss until well mixed.
- Spray a 12"x18" piece of foil with non-stick spray and place 1/4 of the vegetable mixture in the center of the foil. Top with 1 beef patty. Add 2 tablespoons of condensed mushroom soup on top of each patty.
- Seal foil packets well. Place beef side up on a large baking sheet and bake 35-45 minutes or until potatoes and carrots are tender.

RECIPE NOTES

These foil packs can also be grilled at medium heat for about 45 minutes or until potatoes are tender and ground beef reaches 160 degrees.

GRILLED GARLIC CAULIFLOWER STEAKS

PREP TIME: 15 MINUTES / COOK TIME: 10 MINUTES SERVINGS: 4 SERVINGS / CALORIES: 231 KCAL

When slicing the head of cauliflower, try to have as much stem included as possible. The stem is what holds the cauliflower into "steaks" or one large slice. You'll definitely have some random small broken pieces, but hopefully you'll have at least 2 slices that are whole "steaks".

Grill Baskets - Some days we just don't want to bother with carefully managing every single chunk of cauliflower. Throw them all into a grill basket and grill from there.

Ingredients:

1 medium head of cauliflower, sliced about 1/2" thick

- 1/4 cup oil
- 4 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 Tbls Worcestershire or soy sauce
- 1/2 tsp dried thyme (or herbs of choice)
- 1/2 tsp lemon pepper seasoning
- 1/2 tsp chili powder
- 1/2 tsp onion powder
- kosher salt, to taste
- black pepper, to taste
- 1/2 cup cheese (feta, cotija, parmesan, cheddar)
- 2 Tbsp minced parsley or cilantro

Directions:

- Pre-heat grill to medium-high to high heat. Scrape the grill grates to • make sure they are clean.
- In bowl, combine oil, garlic, Worcestershire or soy sauce, dried • herbs, lemon pepper seasoning, chili powder, and onion powder.
- Whisk ingredients together. Brush the marinade on both all sides of • the cauliflower slices. Sprinkle salt and pepper to top of steaks to taste.
- Gently place marinated cauliflower steaks on grill. Cook the steaks • for about 2-4 minutes each side, or until nicely charred with crispy edges. Be gentle in flipping the cauliflower to try to keep them as a whole large slice.
- Lay steaks on platter and sprinkle with cheese while the cauliflower is still hot so cheese can melt. Sprinkle with parsley or cilantro and enjoy!

MANDARIN PASTA SPINACH SALAD WITH TERIYAKI DRESSING:

Ingredients:

8 ounces bowtie pasta noodles 4 cups spinach leaves



- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup craisins 1/3 cup cashews or Diamond of California Pine Nuts
- 1 4-ounce can mandarin oranges, drained
- 1/4 cup cilantro leaves, roughly chopped

Dressing:

- 1/3 cup teriyaki sauce (the thicker, the better!)
- ¹/₃ cup rice wine vinegar (may sub apple cider vinegar)
- ¹/₂ teaspoon garlic powder
- ¹/₂ teaspoon onion powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- ¹/₄ teaspoon black pepper
- 1 tablespoon sugar

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup oil (such as vegetable oil, canola oil, olive oil)

Directions:

- Cook pasta according to package instructions, drain and rinse with cold water. Set aside.
- While pasta is boiling, prepare the dressing. In a . jar combine all dressing ingredients. Cover and shake to combine. Chill until ready to use.
- In a large bowl toss together pasta, spinach, • raisins, nuts, mandarin oranges, and cilantro. Just before serving pour dressing over salad, toss, and serve.

Note: If possible, opt for a thicker teriyaki sauce such as Kikkoman.
