

Reminiscing - One of my favorite things about doing this is being able to pull the history and fun of many places and people



DID YOU KNOW...

Anyone born on or after January 1, 1989 is required to complete a boating safety course to legally operate a motorized boat or personal watercraft on Wisconsin waters AND Paddle Boarders must have a life jacket on the board (preferably being worn).

WE ARE IN SAND COUNTRY HERE AND THE WATER DRIES UP QUICKLY - PLEASE BE AWARE OF YOUR SURROUNDINGS

CHECK WITH THE DNR OR TOWN OFFICE FOR FIRE DANGER STATUS BEFORE BURNING



SAFETY REMINDER: A PWC (Personal Watercraft) may not be operated at faster than "slow, no wake speed" within:

- 100 ft of any other vessel on any waterbody
- 200 ft of shore on any lake
- 100 ft of a dock, pier, raft, or restricted area on any lake

ITS "SAFE SUMMER" TIME

Paddle Board Safety Tips:

- Wear a lifejacket! More than 90% of boat fatalities related to drowning involve victims not wearing life jackets, you need one
 for your safety. You also need one because Wisconsin law, as well as U.S. Coast Guard law, treats paddleboards the same
 as kayaks and canoes. This means there must be a personal flotation device for each person on board. However, the best
 way to obey this law and to ensure your safety is to just wear the life jacket.
- Carry a whistle
- Be a competent swimmer
- Know how to self-rescue
- Know how to tow another board
- Know the local regulations and navigation rules
- Understand the elements and hazards winds, tidal ranges, current, terrain
- Know when to wear a leash
- Be defensive don't go where you aren't supposed to be and avoid other swimmers, boaters, paddleboards
- Use proper blade angle to be the most efficient paddle boarder
- take a safety course, Paddling Safety Course [exit DNR]







REMINISCING - SCHOOL DAYS OF OLD



PEASE SCHOOL — The Pease School is my first choice to bring back as it's very close to my heart and a big part of my family history. My Grandmother, Blanche Friermood, was the only daughter of 4 children born to Lucius D. Pease and Laura Stocker, Lucius' first wife.

Built in the 1920's, the school was originally known as the Mc Neil School (named after Miles McNeil, the owner of a nearby farm) and was located at the junction of County Road A and Halfway Road between Barnes and Iron River. The School was closed in 1937 due to families moving away. The depression of the 1930s and droughts bankrupted many farmers. Ultimately the school would have to close. The building was moved to Pease Road in 1939, and would become the Pease School. This one room school was a typical design of schools during that period of time. It would be used for teaching grades one through eight.

Classes were held until 1943 when attendance diminished enough that it wasn't conducive to keep the school open. The school would see a few owners in it's lifetime, being used as a hunting shack and residence. The most recent owners, and long time "family" and friends Doug & Carol Westerberg, very generously donated the building to the Barnes Area Historical Association (BAHA) so that many people could see what early life in Barnes was like.

The original Pease School was started in 1924 in one of the Pease Resort cedar log cabins on the Upper Eau Claire Lake. The resort, established in 1916 by L.D. Pease rented the cabins during the summer months, but between Labor Day and Memorial Day the wall between its two bedrooms was removed and it became the Pease School. Typically, five to fifteen students attended each year.

I asked Carol Westerberg, Forrest's widow to help me follow the history of the school and it's owners, she of course, graciously provided the following—

Homeseekers Land Company of Chippewa Falls, WI opened the land available to the public on October 27, 1910. The School District No. 1 of the Town of Barnes, Bayfield County Wisconsin bought the land on June 19, 1939 for \$50. It is believed The Pease School
Pease Road - about 1939

school sat idle until Julius J. Ihrig bought it from the school district on November 10, 1953 for \$500. He didn't keep it long, George Martin bought it on November 18, 1953, for \$375. (And, yes at a lower price.) The Martin family used it as a deer shack. George then sold it to Forrest H. Johnson Jr., "Jerry", on August 26, 1967 for \$2,000. It happened to be Forrest's birthday.

Forrest remodeled the school on his own, only having a bit of help here and there. He had a Hardware store in Spring Valley, WI as well as being a high school teacher in Medford, WI. Carol Westerberg, also a teacher in Medford, started coming to Barnes in the fall of 1971 and only saw the "mostly finished remodeling." It was the typical one room school house with partitions for a coat and supply room. This was evident by looking at the original wood floor because of the new tongue and groove boards Forrest filled in when the wall partitions were removed. There was a big pot bellied stove where the furnace was, with a wood door from the outside near it. There was no indoor plumbing, only an outhouse and a water hydrant out in the front lawn, (unfortunately it was taken away when Carol had a new well drilled and found out later that she could have kept it!) Forrest added 3 rooms upstairs as he planned on having his hunting buddies over during the fall deer hunting season. He also put new windows in. Carol and Forrest both did a lot of finishing such as trim, staining, indoor plumbing, and the stone back for a Franklin fireplace. She mentions, the stone came from the woods or where ever we could find it. I met Forrest shortly after we moved here to Pease Rd., and he became our best family friend.

On December 12, 2018 the Pease School found a new home, being moved from its long time home on Pease Road to the Barnes Area Historical Association (BAHA) Museum located at County Hwy N and Lake Road in Barnes as part of the BAHA Heritage Village Project. It was an emotional moment when the school went by on its way to the other side of town. The school, converted to a cabin after classes were no longer in session, holds much of my family's history as we'd spent a lot of time at that cabin from 1969 to the day it was moved. Our family moved just 1/2 mile away from the schoolhouse in 1969 after a tornado hit our house on County Hwy N in 1968, (I was 5 - yikes) 5 miles from where I am now.



Pease Resort School

"As the Pease family grew, the need for a school arose and Mr. Pease fought to establish a school to serve his area of the Town. In 1924, one of the cedar log cabins was converted to a school house. Conversion was accomplished by moving the bedroom partitions to form a fair-sized classroom and a small library room. Every Labor Day the cabin became a school house until Memorial Day. After school closed in the spring, desks and books were stored to allow accommodations for summer guests. This procedure went on until the spring of 1937 when a school house was moved from the north side of Barnes to Pease Road for the children to attend.

"The first year (1924) in the cabin school, there were three students, two Pease children, and a girl who lived across the lake. Edith Carlson of Ashland was the first teacher and she taught this school for four years. During its life time the Pease School had a total of five teachers and they all boarded at Pease Resort. As families moved into the area, attendance fluctuated and reached a peak of fifteen students in 1936 and 1937."

Through the Years

(The following was taken from the Barnes Centennial booklet 1905 to 2005 and A Breath of Fresh Air by David Thorson with additional notes and family history of my own)

Paulson School: ca 1890's (not on map)

The first school in the area was near Tomahawk Lake, and according to Fred Barnes, was called the Paulson School. Aside from the Paulson School, there were fourteen schools in Barnes over the years, 1902 to 1947.

Family name: John Paulson

Barnes School: 1921 to 1947 (Map # 1)

Located at the junction of Country Road N and Barnes Road. This was a two room school, built in about 1920. It burned during

Christmas vacation in 1947. **Family name:** George Barnes

Moore School: 1906 to 1934 (Map # 6)

Family name: Frank Moore

Mc Neil School: 1924 to 1937 (Map # 7)

Located at the junction of County Road A and Halfway Road. The school closed in 1937 when families moved away. The building

was moved to Pease Road in 1939 where there were six pupils.

Family name: Miles McNeil

<u>Ulvin School:</u> Became Roe School (Map # 8)

This building was shown on the 1920 Plat Book map. This section of Barnes Road was then County Road A.

Family name: Ole Ulvin

Note: Some confusion exists on the Ulvin School. There are written references about the school; there is a school shown on the 1920 plat-book across from Ole Ulvin's homestead, but no school records were found with the Ulvin name. Ole and Colleen Ulvin had 5 school-aged children in 1910, so it would make sense they had a school for them. The Ulvin's had 3 school-aged children in 1904 when the school was believed to be in operation. Mildred attended the Roe School in 1913-1914at the age of 9.

Roe School: 1906-1923 (Map # 9) Q11111

The Ben Roe homestead was one-half mile north of this school

Family name: Benjamin Roe

Hall School: 1923 to 1936 (Map # 10)

The Hall School replaced the Roe School in 1921. The building was sold to the VFW Post in 1947, and was torn down for building

materials.

Family name: Darlin Hall

Pease Resort School: 1923 to 1939 (not on map)

Was located at the Pease Resort on Pease Resort Road/Pease Road. The school was held in one of the cabins during the school year and then reverted back to a cabin for the summer fishing season.

Family name: L.D. Pease

Pease School: 1939 to 1943 (Map # 11)

In 1939, this school replaced the school that had been operating at Pease Resort since 1924. It closed in November 1943, when there were only three pupils. This building was then used as a residence until it was moved to the Barnes Area Museum Association (BAHA) site for the Heritage project.

Through the Years continued

Lake School: 1923 to 1936 (Map # 12)

This school was closed in 1938 and the building has been used as a private residence since 1940.

Family name:

Little Red School: 1902 to 1921 (Map # 14)

This was the first site of the Barnes School. In 1920, it was replaced with a larger building, as the population increased and became the new Barnes School.

Family name:

Stafford School: 1919 to 1924 (Map # 15)

There are no current roads to this site. In 1919, access was probably through Cable Township roads.

Family name: William Stafford

Denver School: 1909 to 1913 (Map # 16)

The Denver School site was later the location of the Smith School in 1936 to 1939, serving the Denver grandchildren.

Family name: William Denver

Sullivan School: 1929 (not on map)

Family name: Unknown

Smith School: 1935 to 1938 (not on map)

Family name: Unknown

The following was taken from "A Breath of Fresh Air" by David Thorson

School locations and school names were chosen by need. Homesteaders with a "passle" of kids would often donate a corner of their property for the school and the school would then acquire the family's name.

Travel in the early 20th century was horse and buggy style, with the roads being "goat trails" at best. Muddy, boggy and rutted during Summer wet periods, and the winter piled high with snow from November to mid-April or May, travel was difficult. As a result, the one-room schools had to be located close to the students.

Many teachers lived with the families although a few schools (McNeil for one) had living quarters attached. In the 45 year period Barnes had schools, at least 102 teachers are known to have taught in the Barnes schools.








Roe School 1904 - 1924 (BCHS Collection)



Getting to School

Mulligan Creek Road school families

- Charles Warner family
- Blanche Friermood family
- Valeski family

Back in the day it was quite the challenge to get kids to school who lived down the Mulligan Creek Road (junction Pease Rd). Parents would have to take the kids to school before work and pick them up after work. (Times haven't changed much!)

The School Board was asked to arrange bus pick up but due to budget constraints the request was denied. When they pulled their kids out of school, Board managed to come up with \$ 30 a month to pay a parent to drive the kids from the above families to school.

I remember my dad's stories about when he had to walk down to Pease Rd to catch a ride to school. He would have been going to Drummond school at the time, with siblings Pat and Jerry still attending the Pease School on Pease Rd. He used to talk about walking to school uphill both ways, and ended up it was true! (We've all heard that story)

My grandmother Blanche's step sister Emily Davis (daughter of Lucius Pease and his 2nd wife Emily Tesch) noted in previous works that she remembered paying Mert Warner 10 cents a day for a ride to the school bus.

Sometimes the bus ride would be 4 hours due to pick ups, weather, the state of the vehicles at that time, etc. I can vouch for long bus rides. When my family and I were going to Grandview, Cable and/or Drummond Schools through the years we would have bus rides from an hour to hour and a half, or more depending on weather, etc. as in the early days. Being born and raised in Barnes I know now painful the trips could feel, although, until we got old enough to pay attention to the time, we managed to have fun on the bus playing games, barbies or with hot wheels. (Those of us who didn't get "bus" sick. My sister being one of them, but usually only when we had eggs for breakfast).

Hall School

Grace Christianson, tells about attending the Hall School, which started operation in 1923 and was the place of learning for many Barnes children through 1935.

"The school was a one-room, shed-like structure covered with black tar paper and lighted with single paned windows. The building was heated by a woodburning box stove in the center of the room, circled by dinner pails in extremely cold weather to thaw the frozen contents. Furniture consisted of a few shaky school desks, a bench across the back which served as seats for the larger pupils, and a 'recitation bench' and rickety teacher's desk and chair in the front."

Times Have Changed

Rules of Conduct for Rural Teachers

- 1. Teachers must have legal qualifications.
- 2. They must keep the school room neat and clean:

Sweep the floor at least once daily;

Clean the blackboards each day;

Scrub the floors and toilets at least once a month.

- 3. Ring the school bell promptly at 9 o'clock.
- 4. Raise the flag before the opening of school.
- 5, Start the fire early enough to have the room warm by 9 A.M.
- 6. Keep the school in session until 4 P.M.
- Prepare and present a Christmas program for the community.
- 8. Observe Arbor Day, to beautify the school grounds.
- 9. Women teachers may not dress in bright colors.
- 10. Dresses must be of an appropriate length.
- 11. Bobbed hair is forbidden. If hair is cut short, a switch must be worn in the classroom.
- 12. Married teachers will not be hired.
- Good conduct must be kept in the school, to warrant a renewal of a contract.
- Teachers who engage in unseemly conduct will be dismissed.
- 15. Any teacher who smokes, uses liquor in any form, frequents pool or public halls, will give good reason to suspect his worth.
- 16. The length of the school term is stated in the contract. (either 8 or 9 months)
- 17. Palatable water must be available in the building each day.
- 18. The teacher's instruction must prepare the eighth grade students to pass the county examinations, * which will qualify them for high school entrance.

"The spelling contest held at the Barnes School May 2nd between Lillian McDonald and Ruth Barnes was won by Ruth Barnes. On May 3rd the contest was held at the Moore School, Harry Hilber and Ruth Barnes taking part. At this contest Ruth Barnes was again the winner, and on May 19th she will go on to Washburn."

The May 10, 1917 edition of the Pioneer reports on a spelling contest in Barnes. [Spelling contests or bees continue to be part of the culture of the good old school days today.]



You can get the license applications at the Town of Barnes office. Reminder: Kitties need their rabies, distemper, lymes shots and frontline/collars too! (even if they're inside kitties.) How Regularly Should I Be Cleaning My Dog's Ears?

How often is best when it comes to cleaning your dog's ears at home? Under-cleaning can allow infection causing yeast and bacteria to build up, while over-cleaning can strip away healthy wax and lead to irritation. A healthy amount of wax in your dog's ears actually helps lubricate and protect the delicate skin of the canals from infection. You want that healthy layer to remain, so cleanings should really only be performed when the ears are "dirty."

The length of time it takes for a dog's ears to get dirty depends on breed, coat, activity level, wax production, and even humidity. In other words, it varies for every dog. The veterinarians at Banfield recommend once monthly cleanings as a basic rule of thumb for dogs with "normal" ears, however those who swim, roll in the dirt, or have a predisposition to infections may need weekly or daily cleanings.

Check the ears each time you bathe your pup or after a vigorous play session like a trip to the dog park. A simple wipe of the outer ear and pinna (ear flap) is usually enough for healthy ears that have gotten a bit dirty. Apply a small amount of an appropriate, vet-approved cleanser to a cotton ball and simply swab the easy-to-reach outer folds of the ear. To determine if it is time for a good ear *flushing*, lift the pinna and look inside. Do you notice dirt, debris or excess brown buildup in the outer ear? If so, it may be time to break out the cleanser and do a more thorough job by cleaning out the L-shaped horizontal ear canal.

When You Should NOT Clean Your Dog's Ears

Make sure that your pooch is not suffering from an ear infection. If you notice any of the following symptoms along with debris or discharge, do not attempt to clean the ears; consult your vet right away:

- Odor from the ears
- Puritic discharge (pus) or blood
- Excess scratching, pawing or rubbing at the ears
- Violent head shaking or "ear snapping"
- Redness and/or swelling of the pinna or ear canal
- Sensitivity or pain when ears are touched

It is important to make sure that your dog always has positive experiences when it comes to home care so that he or she will trust you with these treatments in the future. When in doubt, it's best to check in with your vet.

- Chasing, harassing, or disturbing wildlife with your vessel
- Operating a vessel repeatedly in a circuitous manner within 200 feet of another vessel or person in the water
- Operating a vessel within 100 feet of the shoreline, any dock, raft, pier, or restricted area on any lake at greater than "slow, no wake speed"
- Operating a vessel at greater than "slow, no wake speed" within 100 feet of a swimmer, unless a vessel is assisting a swimmer
- Operating a motorboat, other than a Personal Water Craft, at a speed in excess of "slow, no wake speed" within 100 feet of the shoreline of any lake
- A PWC may not be operated between sunset and sunrise
- A PWC may not be operated at faster than "slow, no wake speed" within:
- 100 feet of any other vessel on any waterbody, including a vessel that is towing a person on water skis, inner tube, wakeboard, or similar device, or operating within 100 feet of the tow rope or person being towed
- 200 feet of shore on any lake
- 100 feet of a dock, pier, raft, or restricted area on any lake
- Steering toward another object or person in the water and swerving at the last possible moment in order to avoid collision
- Chasing, harassing, or disturbing wildlife with a PWC

Volunteer Boat Landing Monitors Needed Due to Severe Shortage

Boat landing monitors on Upper, Middle and Lower Eau Claire Lakes, Tomahawk and Robinson Lakes play an important role in reinforcing state laws preventing the transport of aquatic plants and lake water from lake to lake.

The DNR-funded Clean Boats-Clean Waters Program of the Barnes Aquatic Invasive Species Committee provides funds for hiring boat landing monitors but only if we provide volunteer hours to match 25% of the paid staff hours.

According to Lee Wiesner, Town of Barnes AIS Committee Chair, we are so short of volunteers that we are matching at a rate of 6.8% and this threatens our ability to acquire future continued funding. This summer we have not been able to provide boat landing monitoring at the level needed because of the shortage. Many hours on weekends, the busiest use of the boat landings, are left unstaffed.

Most data point to motor boats and boat trailers as the source of the Eurasian Water Milfoil that has infested Tomahawk, Sandbar and George Lakes and the invasive Curlyleaf Pondweed that has hit Upper and Middle Eau Claire Lakes along with the Eau Claire River from where it starts at Middle to above the lock & dam as it drains toward Lower Eau Claire Lake.

The largest patches of the invasive Eurasian Water Milfoil ai Tomahawk Lake is directly in front of and near the boat landing. The only really massive patches of invasive Curly Leaf Pondweed in Middle Eau Claire Lake are in directly in front of the public boat landing. Despite mechanical, suction removal of much of one patch, using the Barnes BAISS pontoon boat from 8am to noon daily during June, 2017, curly leaf pondweed spread to multiple other sites in Middle Eau Claire Lake and to the Eau Claire River.

We need to fully staff the boat landing monitor positions to prevent further introduction of invasive species. Careful removal of all aquatic plants and lake water watercraft leaving the lakes and reminders by the presence of boat landing monitors is a key preventive step relied upon to halt further spread.



RECYLCLING MYTHS AND FACTS:

The most common items to be recycled are: Mail, paper, glass bottles & jars, aluminum, stell & tin cans, plastic bottles, jugs and tubs.

Fact: Only plastic bottles, jars, jubs, tubs with a # 1,2,5 are recyclable. Plastic buckets / pails and lids are not

Myth: Plastic bags, electronics, medical waste, Styrofoam, plastic totes, lawn chairs, empty oil containers, Amazon/

USPSshipping bags, pots and pans can be recycled.

Fact: NONE of these are to go into the recycle bins

Myth: Any item placed in the recycle bin will be recycled

Fact: This is "wish-cycling". Too much contamination will cause the bin to be emptied in the landfill and fines will be

levied to the transfer station.

Myth: It is ok to place small amounts of food waste (garbage) in recycle bins

Fact: ALL ITEMS MUST BE CLEAN Nothing with food waste, grease, etc. is recyclable

Myth: Plates, bowls, cups, saucers, glassware are cyclable

Fact: They are not. This includes dirty paper plates/plastic ware and solo cups

ITEMS NOT ACCEPTED AT THE BARNES TRANSFER STATION: Paint, moto oil, gas, explosives, fireworks, ammunition, flammables, antifreeze, lubricants, corrosives, etc. Ask attendant if in doubt. Keep foods and liquids out of recycling. No loose plastic bags, bagged recyclables or Styrofoam.

<u>All</u> cardboard boxes mut be flattened and 3x3 ft or smaller. **No** pizza boxes.

Madison, WI – The workforce shortage crisis being felt by businesses across Wisconsin includes a characteristic that is often overlooked: The need to support family caregivers in the workplace.

Employers experience a drain on productivity when employees struggle to balance their work lives with the responsibilities of caring for children, aging relatives, or disabled family members. In a recent survey, more than eight in ten employed caregivers in Wisconsin reported having their work life interrupted, resulting in workplace accommodations such as using flex time, reducing work hours, or quitting work entirely.

"Without adequate support, working caregivers and their employers suffer," said Lynn Gall, Family Caregiver Support Programs Manager for the Wisconsin Department of Health Services and member of the survey project conducted by the Wisconsin Family and Caregiver Support Alliance (WFACSA). "The results showed us the challenges faced by working family members and friends a nd the businesses that employ them. Our goal at WFACSA is for every employer in Wisconsin to know about our state's free Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRCs), family caregiver support programs, and other community organizations available to help support their employees."

Conducted in partnership with UW-Madison Division of Extension, the Wisconsin Working Caregivers Strategies and Resources for Employers report published by WFACSA provides insight into challenges of recruiting and retaining employees in the current job climate. It also identifies opportunities for businesses to make positive changes simply by tapping resources already available in every Wisconsin community.

Numerous studies, including a <u>Harvard Business</u> School project called "Managing the Future of Work: The Caring Company," note that employers can attract and retain more workers by helping staff balance work and family caregiving responsibilities. Employers may not realize that one in four working-age adults provides care or financial assistance to an older family member or loved one With a disability or long-term such as an adult child, spouse, or other loved one. This means that at least one quarter of potential hires and those currently working are balancing home and job responsibilities in addition to traditional child rearing.

"We learned that a few small changes can transform businesses into a place where employees will want to build a long career," says Harriet Redman, Executive Director of WisconSibs and member of the WFACSA project. "That is why we are excited to share our survey results and open the conversation around the free and low-cost strategies and resources already available to support businesses."

The survey also found that nearly 3/4 of respondents were not meeting their own personal needs, such as taking care of their own health, and 2/3 had difficulty balancing care for someone at home. Seventy-two percent said they were tired or worn out all the time, while 90 percent said their 2 emotional or physical health had worsened since taking on a caregiving role. (2-page synopsis of survey findings here.)

Approximately 40 million Americans are providing care to an adult family member or friend, and nearly 60% of them (approximately 24 million adults) also work a paying job. Even more workers are providing care for a child with disabilities or special healthcare needs. Not only do employed caregivers experience high levels of stress, but their dual roles also impact their careers and employers.

Fluorescent Lamp recycling

Wisconsin's **Focus on Energy** has sponsored a fluorescent lamp (curly type) recycling program. Residential bulbs can be recycled at the following participating local retailers:

Hayward - Ace Hardware and Co-op Hardware Poplar - Poplar Hardware Solon Springs - Solon Springs Mercantile

Some 5 million Compact Fluorescent Lamps are being sold in Wisconsin annually. While these bulbs save energy and reduce the emissions from power plants, they also contain mercury and should be recycled. According to the Mercury Product Flow Model developed for DNR, an estimated 263 kilograms (580 lbs) of mercury were released to the environment from fluorescents in 2000 -- and this was before the rapid increase in sales of compact fluorescents. The Council on Recycling has chosen mercury-containing products as one of its priorities for improving management, and, where possible, the elimination of the use of mercury.

Focus on Energy has set up a program to facilitate the take back and recycling of fluorescents at over 250 retailers throughout the state. Their web page has a locater for these businesses www.FocusOnEnergy.com. (Under 'Store Type', choose the listing for 'CFL Recycler'.)

1 LB Italian Sausage (Ground)

10 Lasagna Noodles

1 Onion (Chopped)

HOMEMADE TURTLES



Just because we can in the summer too!

I never knew how much I had actually paid attention to mom when she canned until my first try at it. I remembered everything, even to seal it with a "little love." But after mom passed away, it was like I'd never canned before! I kept turning around to ask her what to do next.

Canning is a perfect way to make those memories with your family, and canned goods are such a wonderful gift to give.

Spend time together making memories, as they are beyond priceless.



Here are some items that you'll need or may want to try to get started using the boiling water bath method of processing.

LARGE STOCKPOT: Choose a stockpot that holds at least 12 quarts and is tall enough to allow the jars to be fully submerged during processing.

LADLE: Allows you to safely pour the mixtures into jars through the funnel.

JAR FUNNEL: Place in the mouth of the jar to fill without spilling.

JAR LIFTER: Safely lift lids out of hot water with magnetic end. **BUBBLE REMOVER & HEADSPACE TOOL:** Slide into the side of filled jar to release any air bubbles and measure headspace.

TONGS (with coated handles) Safely lift foods during canning or cooking.

JAR LIFTER: Safely remove hot jars from boiling water with one hand

GLASS CANNING JARS, LIDS AND BANDS: Fill the glass jars with your yummy creation, then seal in the freshness with one-time-use lids and reusable bands.



BEFORE YOU START

Before you start canning, read recipe instructions and gather all equipment and ingredients. Inspect the glass canning jars carefully for any chips, cracks, uneven rims or sharp edges that may prevent sealing or cause breakage. Discard any imperfect jars.

TIPS FOR SUCCESSFUL CANNING:

 Select fruits and vegetables when they are at the peak of their quality and flavor, washing them thoroughly before using.

Follow the directions for each recipe exactly—don't substitute ingredients or change the processing times. Prepare only one receipt at a time; do not double recipes.

- Substitute a cake cooling rack if you don't have a rack specifically made for canning. Place in the canner before you add the canning jars.
- Use only white vinegar when pickling.
- Use a canning funnel, which has a wide opening and sits on the inside of the mouth of the jar, allowing you to fill the jars cleanly and easily. Wipe the threads and rim of each jar to remove any food that spills.
- Reuse screw bands if they are not warped or rusty. Jar lids are not reusable however, so use a new one for each of your canned creations.
- Accurately measure the head space—the distance between the top of the jar to the food/liquid inside. This is critical because it affects how well the jar seals and preserves its contents. A clear plastic ruler –kept solely for kitchen use, is a big help in determining the correct headspace.
- Refrigerate leftov3er product if there's a small amount left that won't completely fill another jar. Use it within several days.
- Use non-metallic utensils when removing air bubbles from the jar and measuring head space.
- Store home-canned foods in your cupboard for up to one year.

HOT JARS VS. HOT STERILZED JARS:

Why do some canning receipts call for hot sterilized jars, while others call simply for hot jars?

If the mixture will be proc3essed in the boiling-water canner for 10 plus minutes, jars just need to be hot.

If it's less than 10 minutes, jars need to be sterilized in boiling water for 10 minutes (or 1 minute more for each 1,000 feet of additional altitude.)

You may ask, why do the jars have to be hot before hand? The liquid/food you're putting in them is boiling hot, thus if the jars are hot (besides the obvious sterilization) you aren't putting hot product into cold jars and taking a chance of them breaking either when the product goes in the jars or when you put them in the water bath.

PAY ATTENTION TO THE PECTIN

Liquid and powdered pectin are made from the natural pectin in apples and citrus fruits. However, they are not interchangeable. Always us the specific type of pectin called for.

100 Year-Old Hamburger Casserole Recipe

Ingredients:

- 1 lb. of lean ground beef
- 1 cup of chopped onions
- 4 cups of diced potatoes
- 1 cup of milk

- **Finally**, add milk right into the cast iron skillet you are cooking in and stir evenly. Lay cheese across the top and cook in a 375* oven for 15 to 20 minutes. The cheese will bubbly and will form a delicate crust on top.

- 1/2 teaspoon onion powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 12 slices bacon do not use thick cut
- cooking spray



Instructions

- Preheat the oven to 400 degrees. Line a sheet pan with foil and coat it with cooking spray.
- 2. Cut the jalapenos in half lengthwise and use a spoon to scoop out the seeds and ribs.

Sprinkle of Weber Herb and Garlic Seasoning

Sprinkle of pepper

8 oz shredded mozzarella cheese

Directions:

- On a 9x13 pan lay out chicken in single layer, top with spinach and mushrooms.
- Then sprinkle the seasonings over the top.
- Soften cream cheese and whisk in olive oil and chicken broth.
- Pour over mixture.
- Lay piece of foil over the top but do not seal.
- Bake at 375 for 20 minutes
- Remove foil and bake uncovered for another 20-25 minutes, then
- sprinkle Mozzarella cheese on top and Bake uncovered for another 10 minutes or until starting to brown.
- Let cool for 10 minutes and serve.

Potato Candy

2 to 3 medium potatoes 1 1/2 to 2 lbs. confectioner's sugar 1 tsp. vanilia 2 tbsps. butter peanut butter

Cook potatoes, peel and mash; cool to lukewarm or able to handle. Add next three ingredients, blending well. The sugar amount will vary according to size of potatoes. The dough should be quite stiff, but not too dry.

Roll out on waxed paper or board, lightly sprinkled with powdered sugar, to a rectangle shape. Spread with peanut butter (1/4-inch thick) and roll up as for jelly roll. Slice and place cut side down on platter. May be eaten immediately or keep in freezer for some time.

CAULIFLOWER BAKE



INGREDIENTS

- 2 small heads cauliflower, cut into florets
- 2 tbsp. butter
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 3 tbsp. all-purpose flour
- 2 c. whole milk
- 2 oz. cream cheese, softened
- 1 1/2 c. shredded cheddar, divided

Kosher salt

Freshly ground black pepper

6 slices bacon, cooked and crumbled

1/4 c. sliced green onions

DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 350°. In a large pot of salted boiling water, blanch cauliflower, 3 minutes. Drain and squeeze cauliflower of water.

Make cheese sauce: In a large skillet, melt butter.

Add garlic and cook until fragrant, 1 minute, then add flour and stir until golden, 2 minutes.

Add milk and bring to a low simmer, then add cream cheese, whisking until combined.

Remove from heat and stir in 1 cup cheddar until melted, then season with salt and pepper.

In a 9"-x-13" dish, add drained cauliflower. Pour over cheese sauce and stir until combined.

Stir in all but 1 tablespoon each cooked bacon and green onions until combined, then top with remaining cheddar, bacon, and green onions.

Bake until cauliflower is tender and cheese is melty, 30 minutes.

PARMESAN MEATLOAF

Ingredients:

- * 18 ounces ground turkey
- * 1 pound 93% lean ground beef
- * 3 eggs
- * ½ teaspoon basil
- * ½ teaspoon thyme
- * ½ teaspoon oregano
- 2 cloves garlic
- * ½ cup scallions *
- ½ teaspoon salt
- * 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- * ½ cup reduced-fat parmesan cheese
- * ½ cup marinara sauce
- * 1 cup reduced-fat Italian cheese
- 1/4 cup parsley

Directions:

- Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Lightly grease a loaf pan with cooking spray, set aside.
- In a large bowl, combine the ground turkey, beef, eggs, basil, thyme, oregano, garlic, scallions, salt, pepper, and parmesan cheese.
- Try not to over handle the mixture otherwise it will get tough.
 Place the mixture in the greased loaf pan and form into a loaf.
- Top the meatloaf with marinara sauce.
 Place filled loaf pan on a baking sheet and bake in the preheated oven for 45 minutes 1 hour.
- Remove the meatloaf from the oven and sprinkle the top with reduced-fat Italian cheese.
- Place the meatloaf back in the oven and bake until the cheese is melted.
- Remove the meatloaf from the oven and allow to rest for 5-10 minutes before serving/slicing.
- Garnish with parsley, if desired.
- I left the scallions out and used 1 tsp onion powder instead and added an additional 1/4 cup marinara sauce to the meat. The additional 1/4 cup marinara sauce replaces the 1/2 cup of scallions as a Green.

BLACK BERRY CREAM CHEESE PIE

INGREDIENTS

- 5 cups blackberries
- 1/2 cup water
- 3 tablespoons cornstarch (Add 1 tablespoon at a time until desired consistency)
- 2/3 cup white sugar
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 2 packages (8 ounces each) cream cheese, at room temperature
- 1 tablespoon milk
- 3 teaspoons grated lemon zest
- 1 baked 8-inch or 9-inch pie shell
- Whipped cream and/or additional berries, to garnish (optional)

INSTRUCTIONS

In a medium-size saucepan, combine 3 cups of the berries with the water. Bring to a boil. Let cool, then strain to remove the seeds. Return the syrup to the saucepan. Stir in the cornstarch, sugar, and lemon juice. Bring to a boil, stirring, and boil for 2 minutes. Cool.

When the syrup is cool, blend the cream cheese, milk, and lemon zest until smooth. Spread evenly in the baked pie shell. Top with the remaining 2 cups uncooked berries. Pour the cooled, thickened syrup evenly over the berries. Refrigerate for 1 hour or more.

Just before serving, decorate with whipped cream and/or additional fresh berries.



EAU CLAIRE LAKES CHAIN -

- Robinson Lake to Birch Lake. Navigable by canoes, kayaks, and most pontoons or speedboats. No bridges to go under.
- Birch Lake to Upper Eau Claire. Navigable by canoes, kayaks, and most pontoons or speedboats. Bridge at Lake Road, just before entering Upper Eau Claire.
- Bony Lake to Middle Eau Claire. Navigable by canoes, kayaks, and medium-sized fishing boats or speedboats. Bridge at Highway 27.
- Middle Eau Claire to Lower Eau Claire. This connection includes a lock and dam that can handle canoes, kayaks, and small fishing boats. Paddlers may find it quicker to just portage up and over South Shore road. Above this point, the river is navigable by canoes, kayaks, and most pontoons or speed-boats—pretty much anything that can get under the bridge at River Road.
- *Upper Eau Claire to Middle Eau Claire. This narrow, rocky passage gets an asterisk because it's only navigable by canoe or kayak. Even then, it's most feasible as a one-way downstream trip. Begins at outlet dam; portage is on private land.

Notes: Sweet Lake, Schuenberg Lake and Smith Lake are all accessible from Upper Eau Claire. You can Canoe or kayak for get into Sweet Lake, or possibly portage a boat through the narrow channel.
